Basically we lined up at the corner of an imaginary St. Andrews flag and at the appropriate nod from our organiser stepped forward to the microphone to say our piece such as "The Turnbull Clan from Bedrule is present". I was terribly proud to be standing there, speaking for the Turnbulls.

On Friday afternoon I attended the Council of Scottish Clark Assn. meeting. To my surprise I enjoyed the meeting. The Turnbull pink card vote was cast as needed.

While in Scotland I visited a number of bookstores dealing in antique books. Our name has now been added to their lists for a copy or copies of "RULEWATER AND ITS PEOPLE" by George Tancred.

Many of the families in Scotland have a copy of this book which has become very precious to them. Some of our members in Scotland will watch for any copies which might become available, I have already been made aware of how expensive this book will be when and if it does become available.

In a very interesting conversation with Tom Turnbull he disclosed that he had known George Tarcred but that his family is not mentioned in the book as the book had already been printed by the time his family had moved to the area. The book was originally written as a sort of keepsake issue for all of the Border families and histories mentioned in it.

The Sunday afternoon, after the farewell luncheon, George and Morna Turnbull, Bill and I returned to Myra's for a little chat and the exchange of some Clan data. As each of us was thumbing thru the assortment Myra started to comment on the material I had handed her. At the same time I was reading the same thing in the booklet she had handed me. Both of us were reading the story of the settlement of Elmira, Illinois, (Special Issue, January, 1985). Sometime during the Gathering Tom Turnbull of Jedburgh had given it to Myra to make a copy for the archives. Needless to say, we were all overwhelmed by the coincidence.

While driving thru the Highlands in the area of Glencoe in a glen near Buachaille Etive Mor, we came upon a crowd, cars pulling in and out and a general mob scene. Discovered that a movie was being filmed. The first issue of "Scotia Newsletter" arrived and it contained the story and some pictures of the movie. It stars Sean Connery and Christopher Lambert and a cast of 600 extras, watch for "PIGHLANDER" it was truly filmed on location.

A very interesting article has been submitted by Robert Turnbull, Liverpool, N.Y. From book: "Surnames of the United Kingdom" by Harry Harrison, printed by "Genealogical Publishing Co., Baltimore 1969, Library of Congress Cat. #68-54686

TURNBULL (Eng.) a nickname of courage and strength, TURN-THE-BULL (f. O.E. turnian, to turn + bul-) The well-known incident of King Robert Bruce being saved from the fury of one of the white bulls in Stirling Park is recounted in Bellenden's (16th cent.) translation of Boece's Scotorum Hist.'-

It is said, King Robert Bruce, eftir his coronatioun, went to ane hunting in this wod,

havand bot one quiet cumpanie with him, and eschapit narowlie of his leif; for ane of the bullis, eftir that he wes sair woundit be the huntaris, ruschit feirslie on the king, howbeit he had na wapinnis in his hand to debait himself fra the dint thairof. Incontinent, ane man of gret spreit, quhilk wes standing neir by, lap afore the king; and nocht allonerlie (only) kest the bull be manifest force to the erd, bot held him, quhill the remanent huntaris slew him with thair wappinis. This man that rescoursit the king wes callit TURNBULL, and wes rewardit with riche landis be the king.

Isn Landles was one of the guest speakers at the Gathering in Hawick. His father composed the following acrostic for him to read.

Think, when that warrior bold turned the bull oveR Up threw the name borne so proudly by you Royalty owned it, as faithful and loyal Never besmirch it, it's honour keep truE Bishop and soldier, freeman and outlaW Upheld its fame across mountain and leA; Live then each Clarsman, Councillor, CorneT, Live for your heritage boundless and freE, Strong still you are, both in peace and in waR.
