For those not yet acquainted with the purpose of ABS, the following is a reprint of a letter which is handed out to all inquirers at the tents.

"The Alliance of Border Scots is primarily a confederation of already organized Clans and Families Organizations, or Societies, which trace their origins to that geographic region of Scotland known as the "Borders" and "The Marches".

The purpose of the organization is to collect and disseminate knowledge of the history, genealogy, culture, and other information relating to the Marcher and Borderer Peoples and their descendants. It is organized to pool Clan and Family talents and resources allocated to the Alliance for the mutual benefit of all member Clans and Families. Another purpose of this organization is to promote fellowship and sociability among all of Scottish descent, Scot-Irish descent, name, and heritage. The Alliance seeks out and encourages others of this heritage to join and support the Clans and Family organizations of their forefathers. Individual members of already organized Clan and Families thus already have an inherent membership in the Alliance of Border Scots and are welcomed to attend meetings and engage in other activities and functions of the Alliance.

Persons who are of a surname for which there is no knowr organized Clan or Family organization of that name may be entitled to membership in the Alliance; provided that their surname, or the surname of an ancestor, is a surname recognized as a surname distinctive to the Ecrder and Marches of Scotland".

TCA members are also members of ABS. A portion of your TCA membership dues, \$25.00 per Clan plus 25ϕ per member, is paid to ABS.

JOHN TRUMBULL - THE PAINTER

"While vacationing in Myrtle Beach, I learned that there was aportrait of George Washington by John Trumbull in the Charleston, South Carolina Town Hall. Eventually I found it on the second floor of the Town Hall where the Town Council hold their meetings. There is a story attached to the painting, perhaps reflecting somewhat on the character of said John Trumbull.

It seems that the Council commissioned Trumbull to do a painting of Washington, who had visited Charleston for a few days. This Trumbull did, but unfortunately not to the liking of the city fathers who wouldn't pay up and requested Trumbull to get it right the second time (in 20th century idiom.) Well he added a horse as the city fathers suggested but as you can see from the enclosed photograph, he painted the horse his way, to show the council members that he was kind of displeased with the way they had treated him." Ed note: The photo shows a large portrait of Washington and to the viewers right is the head of a horse with head bent, to the viewers left, directly under Washington's outstretched arm is that part of the horse which goes over the fence last, full moon view with tail raised. THE LAST TURNBULL CHIEF??????? - TURNBULL (OF FENWICK).

"Turnbull of Bedrule was, without doubt, the chief of this famous Border clan, and the stronghold of this family was Bedrule Castle, although the Turnbulls of Mynto likewise occupied an important position amongst the great Border families. vestige now remains of the castle; even the foundations have been removed; and a few stones bearing a bull's head, the crest of the family, still surviving in the churchyard of Bedrule, are the only memorials left now to mark the seat of this wellknown and turbulent race. In the exchequer rolls, 1501 and 1528, it is noted that king grants certain fines, etc., to Thomas Turnbull, son and heir apparent of George Turnbull of Bedroule. The king confirmed to Heler Rutherfurd of that ilk the half merk land of Bethiroull, in the town and territory of Bethiroull, near the parish church of the same, held in tack by Ferbut Turnbull, with the advocation of the parish church, which she, with consent of her husband, Andrew Rutherfurd of Hunthill, sold to Andrew Ker of Ferniehirst and his heirs. In the privy council records, 1553-4, frequent mention occurs of Thomas Turnbull of Bethieroule, knight, in bonds of assurance between the Kers on the one side, and the Rutherfurds, Turnbulls, and Ormistones on the other.

By these extracts it becomes apparent that the Turnbulls at a very early date became involved in difficulties, and in 1528 a portion of the estate was conveyed to the Kers. It was not, however, until 1623 that the whole of Bedrule passed into the hands of this family, and with it the Turnbulls lost their leader and their chief.

Bedrule remained in the family of Carre of Cavers (Carres of Cavers, formerly Ker, are descended from the family of Ferniehirst.) until 1801, when it was sold by auction, and purchased by Mr. Elliot of Wells. In 1894 Bedrule was sold, with the estate of Wells, to John Usher of Norton for 39,600 sterling. Many of the name of Turnbull claim descent from the original stock, but none can prove a direct descent from father to son.

The family of Turnbull, known as that of Fenwick, have for a long period been connected with the district of Hawick." From "Annals of a Border Club" by George Tancred pp 474-5.

The above gives credence to the assumption that the Clan has been dormant for a few hundred years. To those who have asked about this subject, it is the first recorded information to come to hand.

In the "Introductory Chapter" written by W. J. Stavert, Hoscote, 10th May, 1898, he writes: "The Turnbulls are an ancient family, which seems to have been at the zenith of its power and to have exercised a preponderating influence in the district at the end of the fifteenth century. Their castle of Bethiroule, or Bedrule, was a place of great strength, and at one time most of the land in the valley watered by the Rule was in the possession of the family. In 1561 Thomas Turnbull of Bedrule is recorded to have borrowed money, his surety being John Stewart of Traquair, and his son Walter in 1591, his surety being James Douglas of Cavers. In 1623 the lands of Bedrule and Fulton passed into the hands of the Kers, and shortly afterwards the Turnbulls were left without an hereditary chief. The castle has been entirely destroyed, and although the name is often met with among farmers in the old district, there are very few Turnbulls who now own land in the Border counties; and if some of them believe that they are descended from the old stock they would find it in most cases impossible to give an accurate account of the connexion."
