GENEALOGY

A query appeared in the October, 1991 issue of "THE SCOTTISH BANNER". "I am trying to find where the Trumbull family came from when they settled in the Ohio valley about 1844.

There were three sons and one daughter born to James Trumbull and Hanna Waterbury. The three boys were born in Lucas Co., Ohio: Rufus H. Trumbull - born May 3, 1845; James Nelson Trumbull, born Dec. 23, 1850; William O. Trumbull, birthdate unknown and one daughter, Mary Trumbull, birthdate also unknown."

The author of the article, Isabelle MacLean suggested several sources for research:

"TRIMBLE FAMILIES: A PARTIAL LISTING OF THE DESCENDANTS OF SOME COLONIAL FAMILIES" by Eugene E. Trimble.

"McCALL-TIDWELL AND ALLIED FAMILIES" by Ettie Tidwell McCall. The reference is to Trumbull Connecticut organized in 1797. Check to learn why the town was called Trumbull

"EVEREST GENEALOGY" by Winifred Lovering Holman contains a chapter dealing with a copy of Trumbull records.

"HISTORY OF THE TOWN OF STONINGTON" by Richard Anderson Wheeler contains data on "John Trumbull, born about 1606 came to this country from Newcastle-on-Tyne, North-umberland England. A list of his children and their families is also shown.

"OHIO SOURCE RECORDS FROM THE OHIO GENEALOGICAL QUARTERLY" and "EARLY OHIO TAX RECORDS" by Esther W. Fowell.

With all the various spellings of Turnbull, Trimble, Trumbull you are well advised to collect all data listed regardless of the spelling of the surname and sort it out as the pieces start to fit together. Even within one family one party will choose one spelling over the other.

"THE FAMILY TREE" published by the Ellen Fayne Odom Genealogy Library, Moultrie, GA. April, 1991 issue contained an article by Merle M. Baker, which in part called attention to the opening of the 1920 census to the public on March 2, 1992. The 1920 census will provide the name, address, relationship to family head, sex, age, marital status, if foreign born, year of immigration to the U. S. whether naturalized, year of naturalization, school attendance, literacy, birthplace of person and parents, mother tongue of foreign born, ability to speak English, occupation, industry, class of worker, home owned or rented: if owned whether free or mortgaged.

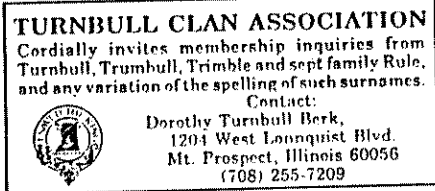

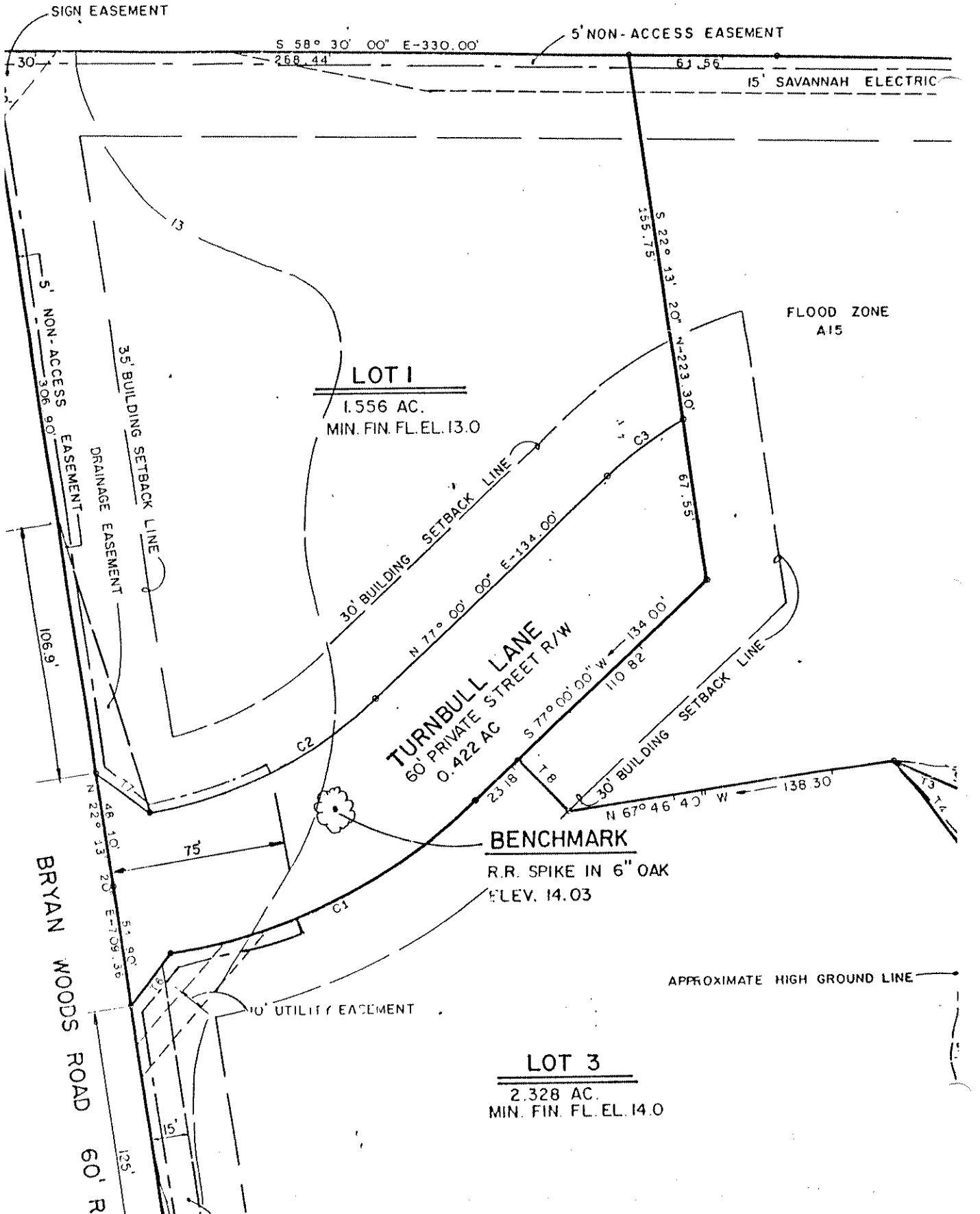


DEAR Ms. BERK,

FATLIPS CASTLE

John Turnbull, Charlotte, N.C. writes: "When I was in Scotland in June, I climbed the easier end of Minto Crags to get to Fatlips Castle. I climbed the spiral staircase to get the view of the Teviot river that "Fatlips" Turnbull had got in years gone by.

Quoting from "The Scott Country", by John Geddie. "Laughs and dells, green hills and wide sweeps of river spread around the fragments of Fatlips Castle, whose owner, a Turnbull, dwelt,

"Mid cliffs from whence his eagle eye
Full many a league his prey could spy".

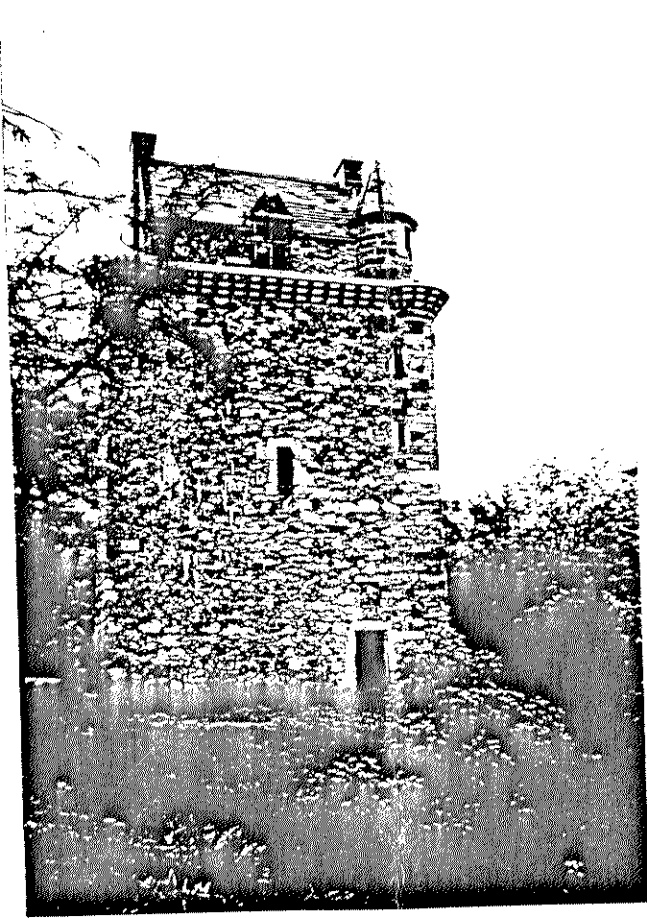
The slate roof is in a poor state and will probably collapse in the next year. The enclosed photos give some idea of the condition of the roof. Fatlips is owned by the Earl of Minto, and though close to the villages of Denholm and Minto is really quite isolated, with no road to the castle and footpath is a tough climb. The dream of course is that one day the Turnbull Clan Association, would own a bit of Scotland, with a Turnbull history, near Bedrule.

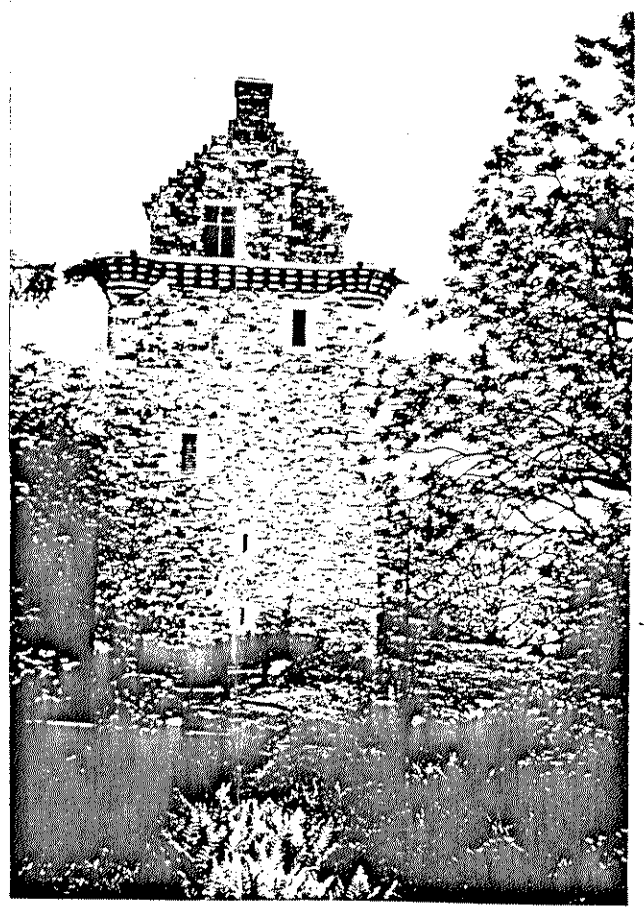
John's photos were in color and we have done our best to have them reproduced in order that the membership can also enjoy a visual view of Fatlips Castle.

THE WHOLE NINE YARDS

"NEWSBEAT" from the MacFie Clan Society of N.A. offers explanation as to how the expression "the whole nine yards" came to be: It takes nine yards of fabric to make a monks robe -- the exact amount of a bolt of cloth; Kilts are made from nine yards of material; Coal was delivered by large trucks divided into three cubic yard sections -- the whole nine yards was an entire truck-ful; Or a concrete mixer truck can be loaded with nine cubic yards of concrete, but because of weight limits, most trucks are loaded with only eight yards. Anyone who receives a nine-yard load gets more than a full measurement of concrete. Me, I vote for the "whole nine yard kilt" theory! MacFie's
