FLOWERS OF THE FOREST

Frederick Myles Turnbull, Clinical Professor of Otolarynolgy, University of California, Irvine, and Chief of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery, Veterans Administration Medical Center, Long Beach, California, passed away on July 14, 1992, at the Landmark Glasgow Royal Infirmary, Scotland (his ancestral home), while vacationing with his family in Europe.

He was 73 years of age.

Born on May 3, 1919, in Duluth, Minnesota, Dr. Turnbull followed in the distinguished medical footsteps of his father, Dr. Frederick M. Turnbull Sr. Both Turnbulls, father and son, became internationally known for their work in the field of otolaryngology.

In 1925, the family moved to Los Angeles and Mr. Turnbull attended Stanford University where he graduated with a degree in Biology and a Medical Doctorate from the Stanford University School of Medicine in 1945.

He was a Captain in the U.S. Army Medical Corp at Camp Stoneman Station Hospital. where he was Chief of Otolaryngology. He completed his residency at the Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital, New York City, where he received a Fellowship in Head and Neck Tumor Surgery and was certified by the American Board of Otolaryngology, Loma Linda University, 1964-1977.

In 1969, then-Governor, Ronald Reagan appointed him a member of the Review Committee for the Fourth District Board of Medical Examiners, State of California, and was a Commissioner of the California Board of Medical Quality Assurance.

He was a member of many medical societies, also a past-President and Secretary/Treasurer of the Southern California International College of Surgeons. An avid sportsman, he loved to ski, golf, play tennis, ride horseback, and sail, to name but a few of the many sports which he enjoyed.

His love of Scotland was reflected in his wearing of his kilt on special occasions and his participation in The Scottish Lowland Clans and Families Society as well as the Turnbull Clan Association.

For many years he was in private practice in Newport Beach.

He is survived by his wife of 48 years, Dorothy; son, John F.; two daughters, Susan Davis and Cynthia Brault; and five grandchildren.

Dr. Fred, as he was affectionately known to our members in southern California, was a staunch supporter of the Costa Mesa Games. Many of our members had the privilege of meeting him at Costa Mesa.

Dr Fred was a decendant of one of the families listed in "HISTORY OF THE TURNBULL FAMILY OF DIGBY, NOVA SCOTIA" by John F. Turnbull. Sheet No. 2 in the book shows Dr. Fred to be a descendant of Capt. Robert Turnbull and Anne Thompson
