The Family Sheets and Pedigree Charts which were enclosed with the last newsletter have been slowly trickling in. Please complete and return as soon as possible.

The information called for on the Family Sheet will show three generations. Start with yourself, spouse, mothers, fathers, and your children.

The Pedigree Chart calls for data on your ancestors. That will involve a lot more digging and research if you are not fortunate to have that information in your family files.

This project will not only enhance our files but will broaden the exposure of your data when copies are sent to The Ellen Payne Odom Genealogy Library, Moultrie, Georgia.

The Odom Library is the repository for thirty-eight Scots Clans, and also hopes to serve as a central source of information and study for those concerned with their Scots heritage.

Searchers who use the files at The Odom Library may contact you if they feel that some of your data corresponds to information in their file.

You might be contacted by some "cousins" you didn't know about.



Dear Descendants of Early Colchester Settlers:

Several months ago it was brought to the attention of the Town of Colchester that one of its most important landmarks was in need of attention and care. The ancient cemetery, where the founders of our town rest for eternity, was being neglected. A public meeting was held to formulate a plan of attack. May 23, 1992, 7:00 A.M. was chosen as a volunteer clean-up day. Colchester pride was at its best when about thirty residents arrived with rakes, lawnmowers, weed trimmers and plenty of enthusiasm. By that afternoon, the Ancient Burial Ground had been transformed into a peaceful and inviting place of history, where local citizens and descendants of our earliest settlers, could trace their roots. Our efforts were rewarded with a view of some of the best eighteenth and nineteenth century headstones in Connecticut. In fact, Mr. James A. Slater, a well known scholar on Connecticut cemeteries comments in his book, The Colonial Burying Grounds of Eastern Connecticut,".... Colchester... is still a town of distinction with an impressive past and one of the fine burying grounds of eastern Connecticut."

This is just the beginning. Part two of our plan is to remove five large, dead or diseased trees that endanger the irreplaceable headstones in the cemetery. With heavy rain, snowstorms or hurricanes a threat in New England, we need to remove these precarious trees as soon as possible.

Third, we plan to replace a rather unsightly wire fence with a reproduction of the original fence. Our recent research has revealed that the east side of the graveyard was bordered with a fieldstone wall, with the remaining three sides enclosed by a fence constructed of stone posts with wood slats. We anticipate replacing an accurate copy of this original stone and wood fence.

Fourth, we are establishing a perpetual fund which will generate sufficient interest for maintenance of the Ancient Burial Ground. The long term goal is the restoration and stabilization of the headstones and footstones of our forefathers.

The Colchester Community Projects Action Committee (CCPAC) has already begun this major project with great spirit. Several private citizens and civic organizations

have offered financial backing for our project. We have also been offered a \$5,000.00 matching grant from the Gardner-Bulkeley Cemetery Fund, and are presently applying for a "Small City and Town" matching grant from the State of Connecticut.

Although Colchester is experiencing a rebirth of pride and respect for our rich history, and our ancestors, raising the \$15,000.00 or \$20,000.00 necessary to fulfill our goals will be difficult in southeastern Connecticut's present economic situation. We need your help.

As you can see from the enclosed list, there are many families who trace their roots back to Colchester. You, as ancestors, can enhance our efforts, if you would be willing to help us financially. The town of Colchester is going to celebrate its 300th birthday in 1998, and now is the time to begin restoration and landscaping of the Ancient Burial Ground for this historic celebration.

Researching the families of those buried in Colchester's Ancient Burial Ground is also important to our organization. Any biographical or genealogical information related to your ancestors would be an important addition to our records. As a result of the renewed interest in this burial ground, the CCPAC will be formulating a list of all known citizens buried here. This list will be available to all interested parties.

Please help us accomplish our goals. We realize that many of you travel to Colchester and visit the ancient cemetery, and with your help, your visits and those of generations to come will be even more enriched and memorable. Our efforts together will provide a permanent historic record of Colchester's earliest inhabitants.
