ROOTS '97

Additional information re Roots '97 has been received, copies of which are attached.

Duncan Paisley has called me twice and was concerned and at a loss to determine why we had not received this data.

George Turnbull has been endeavoring to recruit a group of Turnbull's in Scotland to host the tent. George Turnbull has not replied to your editor's letter so there are no details to report.

It is planned that this event will take place very three years, hosted in rotation by the different regions of south Scotland.

This should give the planners more lead in time and data can be received and distributed in the U. S. in plenty of time for making plans for an overseas trip.

BOOK

"THE TURNBULLS 100 - 1700" by Michael Robson, Isle of Lewis, Scotland. The last letter received from Robson was February 15, 1995. At that time he stated there was still some work to do on the text. He indicated he would be sending it off to an ordinary publisher in Scotland. He said he would keep us informed as to progress, state of readiness when all was accomplished.

In previous correspondence it was indicated that he preferred not to have to do anything with the promoting, printing and handling. A list of Vanity Publishers in the U.S. was sent to him. He replied that it was useful, but not very promising. The only one he knew of was Pentland Press, which, like the rest, put the whole cost of publishing back to the author and whatever support he may have.

The Clan has offered to help in whatever manner it can to bring this valuable book to print and availability. It has been in the works for many years and the members keep asking for a status report.

Another letter will be sent off to learn if the book is close to being printed.

BACKGROUND

A nation such as Scotland with a relatively small population is naturally peopled by family groups who not only claim national origins but close kinship with each other.

In Scotland of old, lands and fortunes were allocated by successive monarchs to the great clans of the north and to the great families of the south. A significant stage in the development of the clans and families took place in the fourteenth century, once Robert the Bruce had established himself as king of a united Scotland. He continued in the feudal fashion by allocating land and power to those who supported him.

The names of those who signed the Ragman Roll in 1296 giving false allegiance to King Edward I of England as overlord, and the Declaration of Arbroath in 1320 which petitioned the Pope to recognise an independent Scotland, clearly indicate the chiefly houses and names of Scotland that existed before and after the War of Independence.

Many other families, however, did not sign these instruments, and even more emerged subsequently and, like their kin, developed into powerful territorial houses. With the passage of time, some of these families and clans have been broken up and many of their descendants scattered around the world.

Historians accept that a distinct division existed between the Highlands and the Lowlands of Scotland, but this fell considerably beyond the so-called "Highland Line." Certainly the majority of "clans" belonged to the Highlands, but the civilised south also had clans, and was dominated by noble houses and families to which were born great men, pioneers and achievers.

Now, geographical and cultural distinctions are of less importance, as for well over a hundred years the identity of the Scot has become one of a national character. Unfortunately there exists still the notion that the real Scotland begins north of the Erskine and Forth Bridges. The visitor who believes in this erroneous view will miss some of the most spectacular scenery, and overlook a very large area upon which a significant part in Scotland's history was played.

It is on the clans and families of south Scotland - for so long eclipsed by the images of the clans of the north - that we focus our attention. Hence Roots '97.

APPROACH

In May 1993 a most successful event was held in Dumfries and Galloway, mustering clans and families with their roots in, or an association with, the south-west of Scotland.

Appropriately entitled Roots '93, it featured many events in numerous locations over a ten-day period, and included exhibitions of community life, historical tours, pageants and lectures. Several clan and family associations also held their own events during this time with considerable success. The major combined events featured a Clan Reception, an Ecumenical Service, a Grand Clan Ball, and most notable of all, a combined Gathering of the Clans and Families at Drumlanrig Castle. To this gathering came many thousands of clansmen and followers of the numerous families represented in the south-west of Scotland.

The popularity and success of this major event brought about the formation of The Clans and Families Association for South Scotland, formally constituted in March 1996 to create a forum to provide advice and assistance for clan and family societies, and a framework upon which to organise major family-related events. This initiative aims to consolidate the values of kinship - the extended family with all its cultural threads - and to ensure that our good traditions and rich heritage continue well beyond the Millennium.

The Association which comprises a team of volunteers from a wide variety of professions, decided to plan an event embracing all clans and families with their origins, or with associations, south of the Clyde and Forth rivers and north of the Scottish-English border. It is planned that this event will take place every three years, hosted in rotation by the different regions of south Scotland.

CONCEPT

The Gathering of the South Scotland Clans and Families, Roots '97, will take place at the Crichton Estate, Dumfries, on Friday 30th and Saturday 31st May, and on Sunday 1st June 1997. This will be an historic event when for the first time *all* the clans and families of south Scotland will muster.

Many of the organised clans and families who have societies or associations in the USA and Canada and elsewhere, are making plans to attend. Members of families that do not have an organisation will be hosted by representatives of those names in Scotland.

The Gathering will be based on a clan village theme, with avenues of clan tents and numerous related traditional craft tents within the complex.

The programme includes an Ecumenical Church Service, Receptions, banner parades with a combined march of the clans, musical and dance displays, and many other activities. Some clan organisations have already planned their own gatherings and meetings to coincide with roots '97. There are also numerous local attractions to enjoy in this beautiful and historic part of Scotland.
