

Turnbull Youth Winners in F.I.R.S.T Robotics

F.I.R.S.T. (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) is a multinational non-profit organization, whose goal is to make science, math, engineering, and technology as cool for kids as sports are today. The *F.I.R.S.T.* Robotics Competition teams professionals and young people to solve an engineering design problem in an intense and competitive way. In 2005 the competition reached 25,000 high-school-aged young people on 1,000 teams in 30 competitions. Teams come from Brazil, Canada, Ecuador, Israel, Mexico, the U.K., and almost every U.S. state. Competition begins at a local level and ends at the International Competition in Atlanta, GA.

This year, Christopher, Brittany and Brian (parents Chris and Lisa Turnbull Jennings, grandparents Lee and Josie Turnbull) are part of the Mechanical Mayhem team made up of home schoolers.

They received the Rookies of the Year award for the high school competition in Manchester, New Hampshire and made it all the way to the semi-finals.

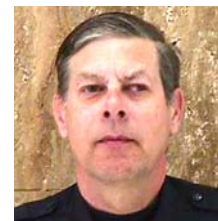

Meet the Member

This month's *Meet the Member* is William Trimble of West Richland, Washington. Bill and his wife Pat are hosting TCA members at the Pacific Northwest Games for the Annual General Meeting in July.



Bill was born on January 28th, 1947, to Kenn and Virginia Trimble in Tacoma, Washington. The family moved to Des Moines, Washington (between Seattle and Tacoma). Bill graduated from Mt. Rainier High School in 1965 and enlisted in the Air Force.

After Basic Training, he was stationed at Grand Forks Air Force Base as an Air Policeman providing security for the Minuteman Missile System, then was assigned to the 377th Air Police Squadron at Tan Son Nhut Air Base in the Republic of Vietnam. While at Tan Son Nhut, he took part in the defense of the Air Base and on December 4th, 1966, when they came under attack by two battalions of Viet Cong/North Vietnamese Army (NVA). They were the first Air Police unit to successfully defend an air base against a full-scale enemy attack.

After a year in Vietnam, Bill was assigned to Fairchild Air Force Base in Spokane, Washington where he performed duties in K-9, Aircraft security and Base Police (Law Enforcement). He was discharged in 1969 and he returned to Des Moines. He attended Highline Community College from 1970 to 1972 and graduated with an Associate Degree in Data Processing.

Bill and Pat first met as children in 1957, when Pat's family traveled from Richland, WA to Des Moines, WA for a square dancing event that included Bill's parents, as well. They were married on February 13th, 1971. Bill returned to college in 1978 and attended Central Washington University where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Administration.

In August of 1976, he enlisted in the Air Force Reserves as a Security Policeman and served until June, 1994 when he retired.

Bill and Pat currently live in West Richland in the southeast corner of Washington. They have two daughters, Stacy and Robyn, who live nearby with their families. They enjoy watching their three grandsons (Mason, age 2 and Casey and Dylan, 7 months) grow up and being part of their lives. Pat is a Secretary for Lockheed-Martin and Bill is currently between jobs after working in security for the last 20 years.

Minto

Historical significance to Turnbells: In the 14th century, Minto was in the possession of the family of Turnbells. It passed from them to the Stewarts, and eventually was sold to Gilbert Elliot, the ancestor of the present family of Minto.

Interesting Facts: One of the more infamous of the Turnbull clan was John, Lord of Minto, nicknamed "out with the sword" because of his fiery temperament. It was said of him, "woe to the Englishman on the Borders who came within the reach of his sword..." He was taken prisoner in 1399, and held in the tower of London until 1413 and killed in 1424 during the battle of Cravat fighting with the French against the English.

William Turnbull, founder of Glasgow University, descended from the Turnbells of Minto. He was born in the early part of the fifteenth century. He was educated for the church and later became bishop of Glasgow.

Sights to see: Minto Parish Church is a must stop. The Church is part of the Church of Scotland and is a Victorian building with a Gothic style. It was completed in 1831 and replaced a much earlier medieval building close by which was recorded as far back as 1275. The Church graveyard is testimony to the Turnbull influence in the town by its many Turnbull markers. The cemetery contains a very interesting and wide collection of Celtic crosses.

Barnhills Tower, founded by the Turnbells, is a 16th century stone rectangular tower house. The tower is in ruins now and only stands to the height of the first floor. It is visible from the road, though easiest to see in winter due to the dense cover of trees at other times of the year.

Barnhills Tower is located south of the B6400 four miles west of Jedburgh on the A68-local roads. It is built against the north bank of a small hill below Fatlips Castle.

The Minto Golf Club runs through the small village. Visitors are welcome with prior arrangements.



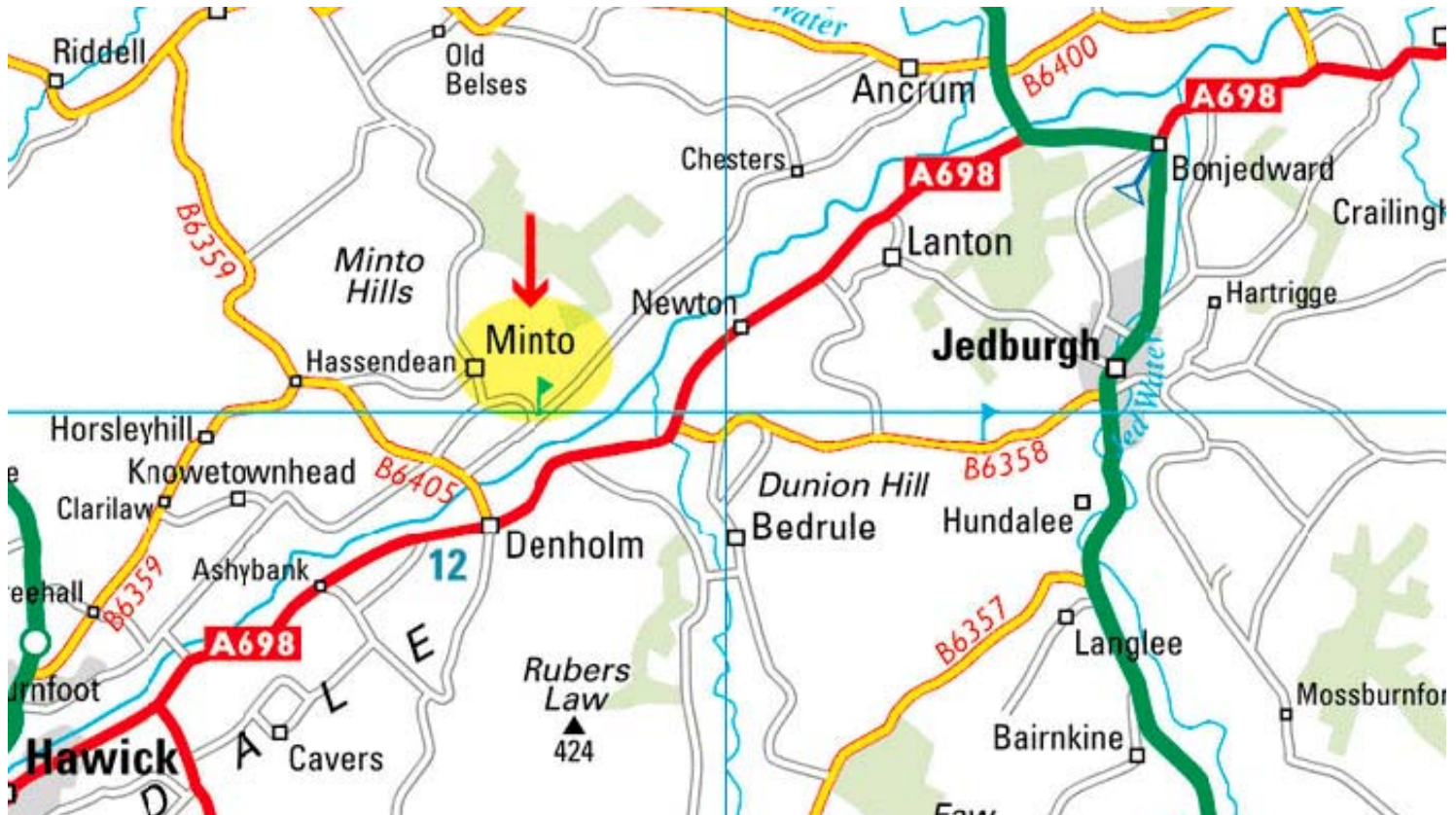

Nearby Fatlips Castle cannot be seen from the village. Fatlips Castle was the Turnbull stronghold until sold to the Elliots of Minto in the early 1700's. It sits 730 feet high on Minto Crag and commands a spectacular view of the surrounding Teviot Valley. Fatlips is historically significant to Turnbull history and will be featured as a separate Turnbull Trails destination.

Side roads accessible throughout the village of Minto offer some of the most spectacular views found in the Borders. On a nice day, park the car and travel by foot exploring some of the country roads and beautiful scenery.

Getting there: There is no public transportation available to Minto. The nearest train station is Berwick-Upon-Tweed, 38 miles to the NE. Edinburgh is 47 miles to the north and London is 356 miles to the south. Minto is located off the B6405 and between Hawick and Jedburgh. Minto is equidistant between the two cities, about 7 miles from each.

From Hawick, travel north on the A698 until you reach the town of Denholm. In Denholm turn left onto the B6405, in a half of mile, turn right and follow the sign into Minto. From Jedburgh, travel east on the B6358. Turn left onto the A698. Turn right onto the B6405. In a half of mile, turn right and follow the sign into Minto.



Places to stay: The closest towns with lodging are in Denholm, Hawick and Jedburgh.

The St. Louis Scottish Games & Heritage Festival

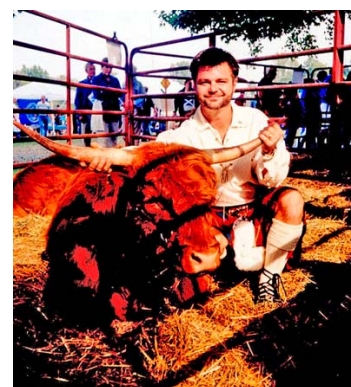

In the early seventies, I joined Braemar Knitwear as a designer of luxury cashmere and lambs wool. A large portion of the business was conducted overseas and during my eight years with the company, I traveled extensively through Europe, Scandinavia, the East Coast of the United States of America and the Far East. The influence of Scots abroad was everywhere in the world of commerce.

My wife, Lynda, is of another Border family, the Elliots. We married in 1976 and a year later built a house five miles from the English Scottish Border at Carter Bar. Southdean was part of the traditional Turnbull strongholds of Bedrule and Minto. It is a wild and beautiful stretch of horse riding countryside which easily stirs up stories of reiving days when families would group together and ride into England and steal cattle to feed the family. Of course, return visits from English reivers were almost inevitable and reiving became a necessary part of life in the Borders and is one of the reasons why we have so many castles and keeps all over the landscape.

Lynda is keen on local history and introduced me to many books and novels which added to my knowledge and interest. Books including *Steel Bonnets* and *Rulewater and Its People* sit on our bookshelves today alongside a load of Nigel Tranter's historical stories of Scotland. The Borderland was the threshold for every army and band of marauders traveling south or north. They lived off the land. A scorched earth policy was not uncommon and the Borders suffered.

From our kitchen window we looked towards Carter Bar with Southdean Hill in the foreground. It was a Saturday morning. Lynda announced that in 1512 over 5000 horses and 7000 foot soldiers mustered on the hill ready to ride into England to make amends for heavy raiding from the English side. You could almost hear the jangle and commotion and hairs rose on the back of my neck as I imagined the scene. Turnbolls, Douglasses, Elliots, Scotts would be among the many Border families called to arms.

The Scottish and English Borders were governed locally by March Wardens. There were three Marches either side of the border. Their job was to settle disputes and hand out punishment in attempt to defuse arguments before they escalated

into all out local war. These trysts were chronicled to tell what happened in those far off, fairly lawless days and are remembered in stories and ballads which are still read and sung today. The same is true of the later times when Scots families took advantage of British sorties into the Americas, Australia and South Africa in particular. It is hard to image the boats sailing from places like Annan in the south west of Scotland bound for lands of opportunity in Canada and the Eastern coast of America.

While the past makes up much of what you and I are today, modern times affect alike everyone in the world. We like everyone else have to make a living. It is a competitive world and we work hard to create a home and give our families the opportunity to experience the world much in the same way that we have. Our four kids are starting to make their own way in the world.

Our eldest son, Mark lives and works as a firefighter in Kings Lynn in Norfolk. His daughter, Megan,

speaks with an English tongue but she loves Scotland and we love to have her here on holiday. Jason, our second son is best described as a rover. Currently he is living in the south of France but we also get communiques from Holland, Belgium and Spain. Kerry is the older of our two daughters. She met her husband, Colin, in France and after a time staying in England moved back to Hawick two years ago to work with a major supermarket chain, Safeway. Amy, our youngest is just completing her final year at Stirling University where she is reading Psychology.

In finishing, there are two items I would like to round off with. I'm sure at times our President Wally despairs of the long delays in my reply to his e mails but life is still hectic for us. I started a design and marketing business in 1980. In 2000, I launched a new personal and business development programme which has proven to be very effective. The process gives a structure to help people define their goals and plan a new way ahead. The process and consultancy support is marketed under the name, Turn The Bull To Your Advantage. The website will be launched in the middle of the year and I hope you will remember to take a look at it in due course.

Finally, I wish to pay tribute to two people, John (Guttie) Turnbull (of Hawick) the pioneer and first President of the Turnbull Clan Association, without whom the whole movement would never have started. And to Wally Turnbull, the current President, whose enthusiasm and energy has rekindled the concept of worldwide networking for Turnbolls.

I hope, in the not too distant future, to visit Wally and his family in the States and simultaneously meet up with many of the others who have kept the flame alive in recent years. I hope to increase my contribution, give greater support and enjoy the fruits of the work these two most notable Turnbolls have started.

Our Trip to Scotland - September, 2004

...After the tour was over, we were on our own. So having seen Glasgow, and wanting to spend more time in Edinburgh, we took the Scottish Rail train from Glasgow to Edinburgh. While the trip should have lasted about 45 minutes, it took much longer, due to the fact that some cows had broken down a fence and wandered onto the tracks. A sharp eyed engineer stopped the train in time, not repeating the same error that occurred about 30 years ago, when the cows caused the train to crash, resulting in several casualties. Having settled in at our Edinburgh hotel, just to the south of the Castle, we spent two days wandering around the city and visiting areas that we missed, including Grey Friar's Church where the famous dog Greyfriar's Bobby is buried in consecrated ground. Every day fresh flowers are put on his grave. It is an endearing story, and I think reflects something that is very true about the Scottish Character.

Then on Sunday we drove to Hawick. It was my first time driving a car sitting on the right side and driving on the left side of the road. Thankfully, there was an easy to follow main road between Hawick and Edinburgh. Hawick was deserted on the Sunday morning we arrived, and on the next three days, it did not seem to be much more populated. It was sad to see that the premises of 51 High Street where The Turnbull Clan Association was founded by John F. Turnbull in 1977 were up for sale, but it is understandable that one must move on due to economic necessity.

We took tours of Peebles and Galashiels. In Galashiels, we visited Loch Carron Mills where our Tartan is woven, but we were not permitted to visit the factory because it was closed for some refurbishing and testing.

We revisited Selkirk, and on many occasions got lost on the side roads of the Borders, but thanks to some very polite and

helpful local people we were able to find our way back to Hawick. A visit to the town (more like a small enclave) of Bedrule and its Church is definitely in order for all Turnbells and I was able to take a lot of pictures which are on our website. However, without a guide, finding Fatlips Castle, except from a distance, was impossible. I did get some long shot pictures.

The most interesting building in Hawick is Drumlanrig Tower, and surprisingly, a very nice article about the Tower was published in the March/April 2005 Issue of the Highlander magazine.

The article also includes a brief history of the area from about the 7th century AD.

We left Hawick on Thursday and drove back to Edinburgh and then over to Glasgow, mainly because there are no major roads directly from Hawick to Glasgow. We were able to see the heart of Scotland from Edinburgh to Glasgow, but as with most major roads, one would have to get off the road to visit the small towns between each city. Nevertheless, in this area, there is a true sense of economic vitality.

There is something to be said for going on tours and also for being on your own. I think that we were fortunate in that we got a very good tour to cover most but not all of Scotland (missing the City of Sterling – where my direct ancestor came from, and Bannockburn) but then again choices have to be made. I definitely would revisit the far north and the Shetland Island. Another visit to Argyll would also be necessary, but what truly amazed me was that the amount of history and historical places existing in the lowlands and the midlands of Scotland.

My view is that on the first trip to a country or a city, the best thing that you can do is get a general tour. Then you can learn where you want to revisit and areas that you do not want to go back to.

Oh yes one final thing - the Weather. It was just perfect. It rained only 4 hours on one day and that was when we were at Glenfinnan, and I wondered if it rained when Bonnie Prince Charlie had landed in 1745. Probably not, because he would have turned around and gone back to France.
