New Smyrna Beach Museum to Have Turnbull Exhibit

After 250 years of Spanish rule, Florida came under English rule. Dr. Andrew Turnbull, a Scot, organized the largest British attempt to colonize the New World. The British government, in an attempt to encourage colonization, offered large land grants in return for the production of cotton, hemp, indigo and silk.

Dr. Andrew Turnbull gathered some 1200 colonists, consisting of Greeks, Sicilians, Italians, and Minorcans and on March 31, 1768, boarded eight ships bound for the New World. About 150 people died en route. The colonists agreed to work for Turnbull for seven years in return for 50 acres of land at the end of their time.

Turnbull was married to Gracia Dura Bin, whom he met while traveling through Asia Minor. Gracia's father was a wealthy Smyrna merchant. Turnbull named the new colony after the birthplace of his wife, establishing New Smyrna, Florida. The new colony was located near the then capital of East Florida, St. Augustine.




The excavation of this stone foundation revealed the floor plan for a large Turnbull palace being built near the beach in New Smyrna. The construction was never completed.

Turnbull traveled extensively and was impressed with the canals used for irrigation that he found in Egypt. The colonists, under his direction, built a similar system of canals that still exists today. The unique irrigation system was new in North America and was strenuous and exhausting work to build. But results produced more fertile farm land, a system of travel and drained the area of mosquito breeding swamps. Three of the original canals can still be located in New Smyrna. Older residents of the community remember when the canal running along Myrtle Avenue was crystal clear. They say that the canal was much wider and deeper than today and the sandy bottom could be seen. At times water rushed through like a river. Children would swing from vines and drop themselves into the cool water.

Until recently, Turnbull's colony was not of important interest except to perhaps local residents and historians. However, archeologists through surveys, maps, and excavation have been able to piece together the remains of Turnbull's 18th century New Smyrna. The New Smyrna Museum of History, under the leadership of curator Judy Burrows, has received a grant from the

State of Florida to build a 1000 square foot exhibit about Andrew Turnbull's New Smyrna Settlement. They have contracted with a group of companies from in and around Tampa to design and build the exhibit. The companies are ADM II, who will do the actual fabrication, Silver Imaging, who are audio/visual/interactive people, and Guglielmo and Associates who will do the design work.



The original land mass given to Andrew Turnbull consisted of over 101,000 acres.

It is hoped that the new exhibit will be completed in the fall of this year. Among the contributors of information is Dr. Dan Schafer, professor of history at North Florida University. Dr. Schafer has over 400 pages of material about the Turnbull New Smyrna colony. Much of it comes from the papers of Sir William Duncan in Dundee, Scotland. Sir Duncan was a Scottish partner of Dr. Turnbull. Their communications back and forth provide much insight to the development and eventual demise of the colony. 



Since that time, Colégio Militar has always followed the guide lines created by the founder. Colégio Militar is situated in Lisbon at Largo da Luz, near Benfica's stadium. Today, the school has about 500 students from 10 to 18 years old. In its 200 year history, Colégio Militar has given Portugal 5 Presidents and many men who have contributed to the country. It is the most decorated military school in Portugal.

Galashiels

While Galashiels is not historically significant to the Turnbull clan it is important in that it is the home of the Lochcarron Mills which manufactures the Turnbull tartans.

Interesting Facts: Galashiels derives its name from the word shiels, which means dwelling. This word is usually preceded with a personal name or name of a place. In this case, Galashiels means the dwelling by the Gala Water. The first recorded mention of the town was in 1124 during the reign of David I. In 1296, the writings of Blind Harry refer to Gala Hill and William Wallace's pursuit of Cospatrick, Earl of Dunbar.

Galashiels has a long history of textile trade and manufacturing. The first references to the manufacturing of textiles go back to 1585. Due to the town's location, they could not compete with inferior fabrics produced in Yorkshire, so a decision was made to manufacture only superior quality fabrics not available elsewhere. The growth of the textile industry led to a rapid increase in the town's population which went from 1,600 in 1825 to 18,000 in 1891, greater than today's population. In 1849, the railway came to Galashiels which provided a new and less expensive means of getting the textiles to market.

Sights to see: The Old Gala House has a history spanning five centuries. It can be accessed through Scott Park. Local artists and exhibitions inhabit the house, which include various aspects of local heritage. Many of the town artifacts can be seen here. There is a painted ceiling in one of the rooms which dates back to 1635 and was covered for many years until rediscovered in the middle of the 20th century. Tea and coffee are served in the Pringle Gallery. The grounds contain gardens and walking paths.

Bank Street Gardens provide a lovely place to have a sandwich (which can be purchased just across the street from one of several little sandwich shops), take a stroll and just sit and watch daily life in Galashiels. In the summer, the Town Band occasionally entertains onlookers with concerts in the garden.

Don't forget the reason for visiting Galashiels is to visit Lochcarron Mills, makers for the Turnbull Tartan. The mill includes a tour of the manufacturing area, a local museum and, of course, a shop where Turnbull Tartan can be purchased by the yard or made up into many different items of clothing. If you don't see what you want, they will make it and ship it.

Getting there: Galashiels is 34 miles SE of Edinburgh, 17 miles north of Hawick and 356 miles north of London. While there is no train service, regular bus service exists from most neighboring towns.

From the south, travel north on the A698 and exit onto the A7. After exiting, go through 2 roundabouts into the town center. From Edinburgh, take the A7 and continue into the town center.
