The Clan Crest Badge

Perhaps the most misunderstood symbol of any clan is that of the Clansman's crest badge. It is the only heraldic device permitted to all Clan members on an equal basis and, next to the tartan, is the most powerful emblem of Clan heritage that one can wear. Unfortunately, it is also the one emblem that has received the greatest misuse by well-to-do members egged on by unscrupulous merchants.

In this part I will set out to explain the Clan Crest Badge in its general terms and hopefully clarify some misconceptions about its use. In the second part I will discuss the Clan badge as it applies to the Turnbull Clan and the problems we face.

The Clan Crest Badge, also known as the Clan Badge, Clansman's Badge and Clansman's Crest Badge, date back centuries to a custom when Chiefs gave their followers a metal plate of their crest. This was worn as a badge of Clan allegiance and was attached to the clothing by means of a strap and buckle. When not in use this was coiled round the crest and it is from this that we get the present form of the Clan Badge.

The rise in people searching for their Scottish ancestry has led to some confusion concerning the Clan Crest. The very name is misleading because, like a coat of arms, *there is no such thing*. Although the phrase legally recognized by the Lord Lyon in Scotland, the Crest and Motto are the Chief's personal property. Under Scottish law, any misuse can still incur hefty fines.

By courtesy, all Clan members, whether they belong to a society or not, are entitled to wear the Chief's Crest surrounded by a belt and buckle inscribed with his motto. Therefore it is not only members with the Clan name that have the privilege of wearing or displaying the Crest Badge, but also anyone bearing a Sept name. The Chief will usually display his crest within a plain circlet inscribed with his motto. If he wishes, three eagle feathers may be placed behind the circlet. Chieftains and Clan members with their own coat of arms (armigers) have a choice. They may wear the Clan Crest within a strap and buckle like any other member, or they may display their own crest within a plain circlet inscribed with their motto. Like the Chief, they may

also place eagle feathers behind the circlet; two for Chieftains and one for an armiger.

The most common method of displaying the Crest Badge for men is usually as a cap badge in combination with a kilt pin and belt buckle. When worn in this manner, the Badge should be made of silver or another white metal. Ladies will normally wear the Crest Badge in silver, white metal or gold as a brooch on the left lapel of a jacket or equivalent position on a dress. The crest may also be worn on shirts by either (continued on page 5)

His first orchestral piece *Indian Pacific* (1996) is regularly played by the major Australian orchestras. His piece *Swamp Music* (1997) won the 1998 Composition Contest of the International Horn Society and in 2004, *Habits of Creatures* won the 3MBS National Composers Award and was premiered by Orchestra Victoria under Simone Young.

Turnbulls in the News

Fulbright Fellowship Awarded to Lindsey Turnbull

Knox College senior Lindsey Turnbull has been awarded a Fulbright Fellowship to conduct genetic research on malaria in the African nation of Malawi.

Turnbull is the tenth Knox student in the past eight years to receive Fulbright Fellowships, among the nation's most

prestigious awards for international post graduate study.

"Fulbright applicants are asked where they want to work, and I picked Sub-Saharan Africa, in the biochemical field," Turnbull said. "I'll be looking at specific locations in the human genome, studying the factors that affect people's susceptibility and resistance to malaria, especially the hereditary factors that make some children more susceptible than others."

"I want to do something that will be helpful to the country where I'm working," Turnbull said. "Hopefully researchers can create better medications, based on what we know about genetics, and possibly come up with a vaccine," Turnbull said.

Turnbull's interest in malaria was sparked by a Knox chemistry class this year in molecular medicine, taught by professor Janet Kirkley. "We talked about several different medical topics at the cellular level, and I did a presentation on what causes people to have problems with malaria," Turnbull said. "It was a powerful experience, learning how problems like malaria can be tackled at the molecular level."

A chemistry and biochemistry major from Edmond, Oklahoma, Turnbull built her research skills in a College Honors project on the effects of alcohol on the immune system. While some studies have shown benefits from drinking alcohol, Turnbull said it also injures the immune system. "It suppresses different parts of the immune system at different levels. If you get a cut after consuming alcohol, your body may not be able to respond as quickly or as efficiently as otherwise."

Turnbull's other activities have included swimming and membership in the Pi Beta Phi sorority. "I've enjoyed being on the swim team, and I was captain this year," she said. "In Pi Beta Phi, we've done a lot of community service projects. We helped relocate the Child Advocacy Center and read stories to kids at the Discovery Depot."

Following orientation this summer in Washington DC, and at Oxford University in Great Britain in the fall, Turnbull will spend between six months and a year at the Blantyre Malaria Project in Malawi.

After completing the term in Malawi, "I may go to graduate school, but I don't know right now," Turnbull said. "I expect my experience in Africa to change me in some way, and I'm open to that."

Fulbright grants are funded by the U.S. State Department and administered by the Institute of International Education, with additional support from participating countries and educational institutions. The program awarded approximately 1,200 student fellowships last year.

The program was established 60 years ago to increase mutual understanding between the United States and other countries. Fellowships are awarded to outstanding college graduates, graduate students, young scholars and higher education faculty. ... Knox College Press Release

Turnbull Statue at Fitzwilliam

Cambridge's Fitzwilliam Museum has taken possession of a striking new sculpture.

The 10 ft. tall bronze work of art, called Large Blade Venus, was created by sculptor William Turnbull, and will be on display in the museum's recently-revamped Courtyard area. The sculpture has been given to the Fitz by the Art Fund, the UK's largest independent art charity, after it was bought from the artist for £141,000. It has been passed on to the museum in honour

of the Art Fund's former chairman, Sir Nicholas Goodison, who retired in 2002 after 16 years in office.

A long-standing admirer of Turnbull's work, Sir Nicholas and his wife have been regular donors to the Fitzwilliam via the Art Fund, adding more than 50 pieces of contemporary craft to the museum's collection.

Turnbull is the son of a Scottish shipyard engineer. Born in Dundee in 1922, he joined the Royal Air Force in 1941, serving as a pilot during the Second World War, and between 1946 and 1948 he studied at the Slade School of Fine Art in London. Cambridge Evening News - Cambridge, England, UK




Ivory handled knife

sew-on patches or screen printed. If a color version is used, care should be taken not to confuse the strap and buckle with the Order of the Garter by using blue with gold or yellow trim. Black and gold or black and silver are the more appropriate colors to use.

Because the demand for artifacts bearing Crest Badges has greatly increased, merchants are keen to offer the Clan Crest in all sorts of paraphernalia. Members are now able to "show their Clan pride" through products such as plaques, pens, key rings, coasters, cups and glasses all the way to underwear. It is one thing to hang a Crest plaque on the wall, but to wear the "Family Crest" over the "Family Jewels" is down right tasteless.

From its inception over five hundred years ago, the Clan Crest Badge has remained with the times. What once united men in war still unites today, so that no matter where we are in the world, we have a sense of belonging not just as a clan, but as a family. (to be continued.)

"God Is Looking For Men Who Are....."

In honor of Father's Day, TCA member Bob Turnbull recently shared advice on being a father. He shares a portion of that advice to Dads with his TCA family.



God is looking for men who are - Authentic - and men who are - Available!

AUTHENTIC: Your wife, children, coworkers and friends have video camera eyes and audio tape recording ears. They see and hear EVERYTHING. Authentic means you are the same on the outside as you are on the inside.

1. WALK YOUR TALK

We should strive to be authentic, but when we fall short we should also be willing to admit to our kids and spouse when we have blown it. They already know we have blown it. Hey, they live with us. Not hard to spot. We need to apologize to them and ask for their forgiveness. We are teaching them that when they make a mistake it is not the end of their world, but that they can admit it and grow from it.

2. KEEP YOUR PROMISES

If you promise your kids or spouse something, KEEP IT. Be consistent with your promises. The number one resentment with kids are the broken promises of their parents. To a child, "Probably, perhaps and maybe" mean YES. Only mention out loud what you can follow through on.

One of the biggest areas that we often disappoint our family is with our time schedule. To enable you to keep your promises make appointments with loved ones non-negotiable commitments. Put them on your calendar first and then schedule other things around them. By doing that they learn to trust that you are man of your word, otherwise you will not spend the quality time with them you should. I know you do not want to end your life full of family regrets.

AVAILABLE: A man needs to be available to his family and God.

AVAILABLE TO FAMILY:

Too often as men we focus on being a success at work and then do not have any availability with our time or energy for our children and wife. Or when we *are* with them we sometimes make them feel like we can only spend time with them *during the commercials*. For too many years I made my family feel they were infringing on my time frames - that I had more important things to do. The message I was giving them is that they were not a priority.

Fortunately God woke me up before I lost everything. Here are a few things I implemented into my life -- Live In The *Now* -- When you spend time with the family - "be there." That means not just physically being there, but also emotionally. Actually be involved in whatever you are doing and not focused on what you think you would rather be doing.

Date Your Mate You need to have face-to-face time with one another. It is a special time to have fun and stay connected. It helps, too, if you do the planning and get the baby sitter.

Date your children One child at a time. An exclusive time with dad - hiking - zoo - park - getting ice cream. Make sure it is a time you can talk. When your child knows they can have your full attention they will often share their deepest thoughts with you.

Practice Good Listening A good way to demonstrate availability is to listen when they talk. To help you do that, get rid of distractions such as the TV, computer and newspaper. Listen without interrupting or changing the subject. Maintain eye contact. Eye contact sends a powerful message to them that what they are saying is important.

AVAILABLE TO GOD Through the Word of God and talking with God through prayer, God works on the inner man so we can become a man after God's own heart. As your family sees you growing and changing it will help them understand what a relationship with our Lord is all about.

Our family implements the Three A's of Prayer, meaning, we all can pray Anytime - Anywhere - and about Anything.

In closing - men *must* walk the talk. Nothing more - nothing less - nothing else! Be all you can be for Christ, and watch Christ do all He can through you.

Wearing the Tartan with Pride – and Knowledge

Past Bullseye editions have encouraged members to wear their colors and to proudly display the tartan. Those who wish to do this may find themselves wondering just how to do that properly. With summer upon us and the height of the Scottish games season, particularly for North Americans, it seems a good time to address this issue.

For men, wearing a kilt may take some getting used to. Here are some tips on how to put it on and the accessories one will need.

To wear the kilt, begin by taking the right apron of the kilt through the hole of the left buckle and fastening it to the left buckle. Fasten the left apron to the right; the fringed edge and kilt pin should be to the right. Make sure that your kilt falls to the center of the knee, sitting exactly on the natural waist. Make sure pleats are at

the back of the kilt. Put on your belt. Strap on the sporran about three fingers below your waistcoat or belt. The strap fastens in the back. Wear kilt hose folded two to three fingers below kneecap. Place flashes on the outside of the leg, covering the strap with the fold of the sock top. Lace the ghillie brogues this way: cross laces and pull into simple knot. Twist three times and pull tight again to create a thong. Pass laces around ankle back, bring to front and tie a bow, letting laces and toggles hang in front.

A kilt always looks nice with a white shirt, but there are other options and it is up to you as to what you choose to wear.

In addition to a kilt, there are several accessories, some very practical and others mainly decorative. Men may want to include some of the following to finish the attire. (continued on page 8)

Belt, Buckle	Today, the kilt belt is primarily decorative. They are usually between 2 and 3 inches in width. The belt buckle provides a way to personalize the kilt. A buckle with one's clan name or a Scottish theme, like a thistle is often used. (Before the tailored kilt, a belt was essential in keeping the kilt from falling down.)
Kilt Pin	A kilt pin is not a necessity, but does serve a purpose in not only being decorative, but in keeping the kilt closed. Pins come in a very simple form to very decorative ones, which include clan crests.
Sporran	As a kilt has no pockets, for carrying wallets or keys, typically it is worn with a sporran. A sporran is a pouch made of leather or fur that is worn on a chain around the waist on the front of a kilt. Brown or black leather sporrans are less formal than ones made from fancy furs.
Kilt hose, Garter flashes	Kilt hose, made of wool or Acrylic or some combination thereof come in a variety of colors and can be found in complementary colors to the tartan. Off white is also a popular choice. White is not generally worn, unless part of a specific uniform. The garter flashes are colored ribbons attached to elastic bands and are designed to keep the kilt hose from falling down. The ribbons come in an assortment of colors so as to match or complement the tartan colors in the kilt.
Skeen Doo, Sgian Dubh	A small knife called a Sgian Dubh or skeen doo is often worn tucked into the top of the kilt hose. This has its origin as a utility knife. As with most items, this can come in a variety of styles from simple to very elaborate designs. Because of security issues, today imitation ones may be purchased.
Ghillie brogues	These are a type of shoes with laces along the instep and no tongue. They were designed to dry quickly and not to not get stuck in the mud as the laces were above the ankles and would hold the shoe in place. Today many men choose to wear a regular dress shoe or sport shoe with their kilts.



(continued from page 7) Women will find kilted skirts in any length from knee to below the knee to long. Tams and scarves may also be worn on the head. In dressing, however, the most important rules for women include knowing how to properly wear the sash or scarf. Out of respect for tradition and a desire to adhere to custom, there is a protocol in the wearing of the sash.

A clan woman wears her sash over the chest and pinned on the right shoulder with a small brooch or pin (see figure 1). The wife of a chieftain or a Colonel in the Scottish Regiment wears her sash across the breast and pinned on the left shoulder (see figure 2). Since the Turnbull clan does not have a chieftain, unless you are the wife of a Colonel in the Scottish Regiment, sashes are to be worn on the right side.

A woman, who married into another clan but wishes to wear the tartan of her original clan, wears a sash longer than the usual sash. It is pinned on the right shoulder, drapes across the chest and is fastened in a bow at the left hip (see figure 3).

For dancers or women who wish to keep the front of their dresses free from sashes, a sash is attached to the right shoulder and can hang freely in the back, be attached at the waist in the back with a small button, or be tucked into a small belt. It is attached to the right shoulder so that the ends fall backwards. (see figure 4). The Royal Scottish Country Dance Society were granted permission by Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, to wear their sashes on the left shoulder, as she is a
