



Minutes of the Annual General Meeting – 2007 – Melrose, Scotland

The Business meeting of the Annual General Meeting of the Turnbull Clan was held on Thursday June 14th, 2007 at The Townhouse, Melrose, Scotland at 8:50 p.m. There were 35 members present.

President Wally opened the meeting by discussing our commitment to the monument in Hawick and the plans for it to be unveiled at Easter in 2009. It will be a 1½ life size bronze monument of William Rule turning the bull. He proposed that the contributors would be individuals and businesses known and/or suggested by our members.

Sponsorship incentives will also be given at all levels. He proposed that it be presented thus:

- every sponsor receives a certificate of appreciation suitable for framing
- a donation of \$500 or more receives a flag flown over Bedrule
- a donation of \$5,000 or more receives a fine art bronze limited edition (100) sculpture, numbered and signed by the artist.

Another thing that is being investigated is the idea of pavers or bricks with names of donors. Pat Trimble suggested that perhaps the bull would be on a raised base and the pavers placed around it, subject to approval of course. It would be expected that all members of the Clan would donate something to "our" Monument.

Wayne William John Turnbull 1944-2007



Family and friends crowded the Boolarra Uniting Church on September 10th to bid farewell to Wayne Turnbull, who passed away on September 3rd, two days short his 63rd birthday. Born in the Melbourne suburb of Caulfield on September 5, 1944 to Horace and Phyllis (nee Appleyard) Turnbull, Wayne was the

younger of two children. It was often said that he came out with the wash, because he was born while his mother was hanging out the washing to dry.

Wayne's career paths included car repair, construction, sawmilling, dairy farming and most recently painting houses. Wayne and Margaret Miles were married at Inverloch on April 15, 1967. The couple had a son, Sandy, and three daughters, Kerrine, Kylie, and Kathleen.

Wayne often used the phrase "never look down on someone unless you're helping them up," words he carried with him to the very end. This was a philosophy that earned him the respect and admiration of those around him.

Wayne was admitted to the Latrobe Valley hospital on September 2nd (Father's Day in Australia) where he later succumbed surrounded by family. The funeral, conducted by the Rev. Russell Jones, included the reading the poem *The Chosen* by Ella Wheeler Wilcox followed by the Eulogy given by his son, Sandy. This was followed by a time of reflection on one whose epitaph needs only three words: HUSBAND, FATHER, FRIEND. Wayne will be long remembered by his extended TCA family.

Eugene Dudley Bowman 1921 - 2007



Eugene D. Bowman, born Dec. 4, 1921, in Shattuck, OK, passed away at his home Sept. 18, 2007. Gene is survived by Jimmie Jean Pate Bowman, his wife of 63 years. In WWII he served in the Army Medical Corps at Pine Bluff, AR Arsenal and the 240th General Hospital, Nancy, France.

After retiring from Riley-Beaird in 1984,

Gene developed a talent for oil painting and generously shared scenery and portraits with friends and family.

A long time resident of Shreveport, LA, Gene was a member of Andrew Class of Brookwood Baptist Church, Brookwood Painting Partners, American Legion Post, #0401, Turnbull Clan Association, The Sons and Daughters of the Province and Republic of West Florida 1763-1810 and is a direct descendent of Louisiana Pioneer Families of Bowman-Turnbull and Filhiol-Muse. No doubt about it, we have wonderful volunteers! CD wants to thank everyone who kindly & generously offered to help with the intriguing text sent to the Clan's office for translation. Here is a composite rendition of the first paragraph, it is a combined translation from various volunteers, the rest (21 pages) is being translated & CD will reveal the whole once the completed project is returned to us.

"The local population (clans) cared little about the English and Scottish crowns and it was therefore easy to change allegiance from one country to the other. It was the same with pacts with other families. Those were made and just as easily broken, if that happened to be convenient."

"The raids back and forth led to feuds. Those existed between the groups on both sides of the border and also between ones with different surnames in the same country. It did not take much to start a feud, but a lot to stop it. Feuds could last for many generations."

"Most thefts happened between Lammas (loaves of bread made with the ripe grain – August 1) and Candlemas (church celebration of presentation of Christ in the Temple - February 2). The harvest was then already gathered inside and the cattle was well fed. The darkness of the early evening offered good protection to the criminals and the courts were in recess." In addition to what we have learned from these paragraphs, here are other discoveries made in the course of this investigation: The "Feuding Family" names from last month's chart are from the book, <u>The Steel Bonnets</u> by George Macdonald Fraser. The book covers the period from 1286 to the Union of 1603 & is said to be the most accurate & readable book about the wars between England & Scotland.

It is not surprising that you would find Turnbulls in the Netherlands as many Turnbulls fled England after the Scots were massacred by the English. That period was a very bloody time in the borders & those who could, escaped to Europe & Ireland. The Turnbulls fled Scotland & settled in France, Belgium, Portugal & the Scandinavian countries in the 16th century & never went back to Scotland. The Scottish Genealogy Society often hears of people in the European countries, including Russia, looking for answers on how or why their Scottish ancestors first came to their country."
