


The plan at this point was to travel onto Loon Mountain in New Hampshire for the AGM and games. However, a little spontaneity took over and a couple of

TURNBULL TRAILS A HISTORY OF THE BORDER CLAN TURNBULL

THE BATTLE OF PHILIPHAUGH


The English civil War was really a British Civil War as it obviously embraced Wales, dragged in Ireland and had profound consequences for Scotland. After all Charles I was king of Scotland as well as England and he had his supporters and opponents both North and South of the Border.

Philiphaugh was not the usual English v Scots conflict but was a Scottish battle fought on Scottish soil between two sets of Scots; Royalists (supporters of the king) and Covenanters (those who supported the Covenant of 1638 pledged to protect the Presbyterian religion).

In 1643, the Scottish Parliament decided to give military assistance to the English Parliamentarians, on the assumption that a Parliamentary victory would be in the best interests of Scotland.

Although previously a supporter of the Covenanters, James Graham, Marquis of Montrose, remained loyal to the king and became the main champion of the Royalist cause north of the Border. In 1645, after a serious of stunning victories against the Covenanters, Charles I ordered him to march south to the Borders.

On 12th September Montrose arrived at Philiphaugh near Selkirk. Here he camped in a secure position at the junction of the Ettrick and Yarrow rivers, protected by the two rivers to the south and the hills of Ettrick Forest to the North. Meanwhile David Leslie, commander of the Scottish forces fighting in England, marched back into Scotland. By the 12th of September,

unknown to Montrose, he was camped nearby between Selkirk and Galashiels. Leslie had around 6,000 men; Montrose only had around 700 as many of his Highland and Irish troops had gone back home and his recruiting efforts in the predominantly Presbyterian Borders had received a lukewarm response.

Next morning Leslie advanced towards Philiphaugh and split his army into two groups. One group, led by Agnew Lochnaw, moved northwards through the gap between Linglie Hill and Peat Law and attacked Montrose's troops from the rear. Leslie commanded the second group, which marched along the river valley. Taken by surprise and hopelessly out numbered, Montrose's men stood little chance. Hastily dug trenches proved inadequate and although Montrose led a sprinted cavalry charge against Leslie's horsemen and fought bravely, his troops were

driven back with great losses.

The lucky ones, including Montrose himself, escaped over Minch Moor. The Irish troops that surrendered were either massacred on the battlefield or while in captivity at nearby Newark Castle. For the moment the Royalist cause was over in Scotland as well as in England. This battle was fought on the lands given to the Clan Turnbull by Robert the Bruce for Will-o-Rule saving his life in the Caledonian forest.

From the centre of Selkirk you head down into the valley of the Ettrick Water, walk across the site of the battle and head up into the hills and woods of Philiphaugh Estate on the other side of the valley. The views over the valley and the rolling hills of Ettrick Forest are magnificent, route finding is easy and the climbing is steady rather than strenuous.

John Turnbull Returns to Haiti

John Turnbull of Mendocino, California, answered a call and traveled to Haiti in May of this year. He worked with relief teams rebuilding housing for victims of the January 12, 2010 earthquake.

John has just returned from his second trip to the island nation. This time, John spent his time working near the capital of Port-au-Prince hand in hand with national workers building an orphanage.





The Story of Joan Trimble


Joan Trimble was born in Enniskillen, Co. Fermanagh, Ireland. She studied at the Royal Irish Academy of Music and Trinity College in Dublin before going to the Royal College of Music in London to study piano with Arthur Benjamin and composition with Vaughan Williams and Herbert Howells.





In 1957 her opera, Blind Raftery, a BBC commission, was broadcast on television. This was her last major composition until 1990, when a seventy-fifth birthday commission from the Arts Council of Northern Ireland persuaded her to write a wind quintet. CDs of her music have been released on the Koch International Classics and Black Box labels. In 1999 a disc of her songs and chamber music was issued on the Marco Polo label.

Or so they thought. Interestingly, Norman was enjoying telling about the connection of an American named John Trumbull, originally of Scottish origin, and his connection to George Washington. Trumbull was a friend and advisor to Washington, being called "the

first of the patriots," by Washington. About this time, there was an exit for Trumbull, Connectitcut. Being close to Norman's tea time, a stopover appeared appropriate. Asking locals who the town was named for didn't turn up much. However, while looking for the way back to the main highway, Wally drove by a sign at the entrance to the town. Trumbull, CT is named for the very John Trumbull of Norman's story. In addition to being a valuable friend to Washington, Trumbull served as




governor of Connecticut from 1769-1784.





Turnbull Branches

Richard Turnbull of Oxfordshire, UK, recently shared this letter with President Rhet Turnbull for fellow clan members. The letter was written in July of 1893.

Richard acquired the document about 10 years ago via his great-grandfather, Andrew (1899-2000). Andrew, known as Papa to Richard, lived in Hawick, Scotland until the age of 100 (and yes, Richard says he got his letter from the queen!).

The letter was written by a great great uncle of Richard's, named John Turnbull.

While difficult to read, the letter alludes to his (and therefore) Richard's descendancy from the original Turnbull Clan.

It states that the "Turnbull" name descends from a strong man named "Ruel" who turned a wild bull by the head that was charging at King Robert the Bruce, saving him from certain death. For his bravery the king gave him the Lands of Badyruel in Teviotdale and the name Turnbull. (continued on page 9)

A true account and description of the Original of the Name and Arms of Turnbull

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The heads of Bulls are frequent in Arms, and as all other heads (of which before) represents the whole cuature. The Name of Turnbull, carryed tragent a Bull's head, wand sable, of late three of their disposed 2 and 1. The first of the name with us, was a strong Man of the name of Ruel, who turned a Wild Bull by the Head, which violently run against King Robert Bruce in Stirling Park, for which he get from that King the Lands of Badyruel in Twistdale, and the name of Turnbull.

Sedward Howes in his history of England page 231, mentions this man in the minority of King David Ornice at the Battle of Holydownhill, his words are. "A certain Stout Champion of great Stature, who for " a Fact done by him, was called Turnbull, advanced "before the Scots Army, and a great mastire Dog with "him; and challenged any of the English Army to fight "with him a Combat. One his Robert Venal, a Norfolk " man, by the King of England's leave; took him up, and " hilled him and his dog too." This happened Armo 1883, King reward 3" of England's Reign.

(continued from page 8) John Turnbull is documented as being a descendant of the family of Badyruel and therefore a descendant of the original Turnbull clan. Richard says "My ancestry would be as follows:"

"Ruel Turnbull (from the document, he who turned the bull) ... John Turnbull (from the document, believed to be my relative) ... Andrew Turnbull (my great-grandfather) Walter Turnbull (my grandfather) John Turnbull (my father) Richard Turnbull (myself)."

Interestingly, the book *New England families, genealogical and memorial: a record of the achievements of her people in the making of commonwealths and the founding of a nation,* edited by William Richard Cutter, connects John Trumbull (see Norman Invasion, page 1) with Badyruel. (today known as Bedrule) Could Richard and Trumbull be related?


