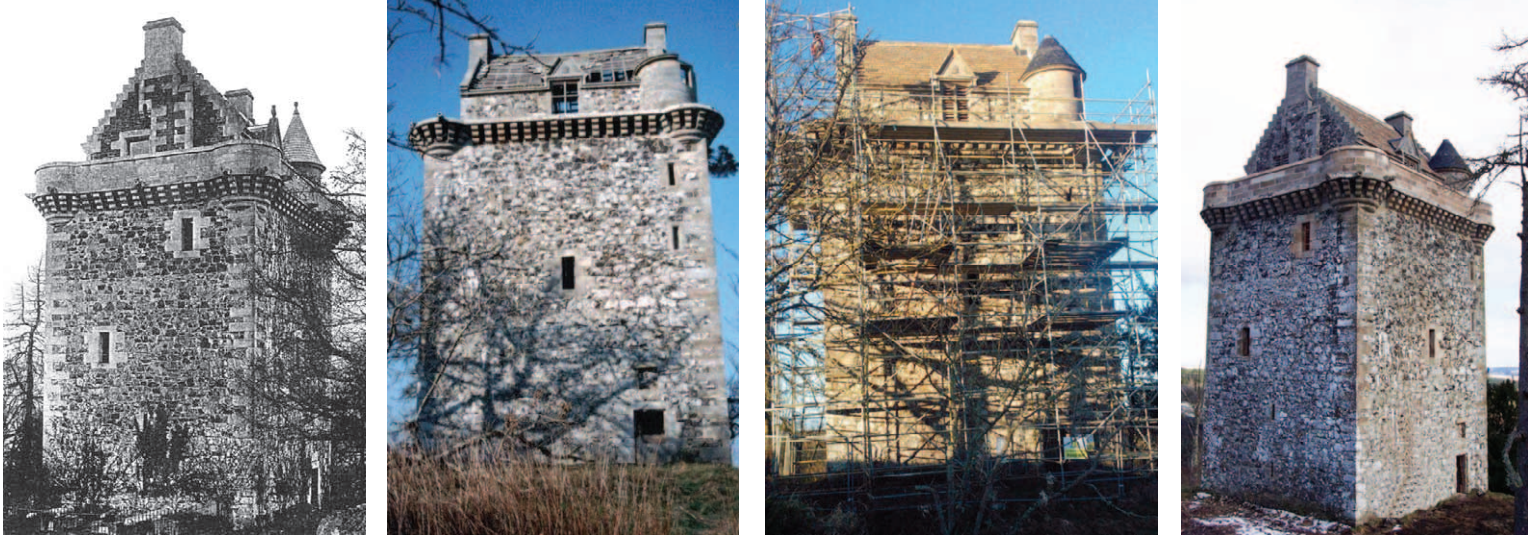


FATLIPS RESTORATION COMPLETED!

Fatlips Castle, a 16th century pele tower of rectangular stone was founded by the Turnbulls of Barnhill. It is located at the top of Minto Crags in Roxburghshire, Scotland.

The entrance to the tower leads to a vaulted basement with a spiral stair in one corner giving access to the other two stories and a garret. A round caphouse found at the garret leads to a corbelled parapet. Magnificent views of the Borders and Ruberslaw can be seen from the parapet. The tower is 8.15 meters from north to south and 9.83 meters from east to west.

Fatlips was acquired by Sir Gilbert Elliot in 1705, whose family became the Earl of Minto. The castle was extensively restored in 1857 by Sir Robert Lorimer. The interior was further renovated in 1897-1898. It was used as a shooting lodge and private museum until about 1960. Since that time until very recently, the building was in ruins, worsening each year. It was to the point that there was not much roof at all left and the door was cemented closed to prevent people from entering and being injured.

How Fatlips got its name has several theories. One is that the Turnbulls had a child with Down Syndrome, and he lived in the castle away from others. Another goes back to a supernatural being known as Fatlips, named so by a disturbed woman who lived in castle shadows during the day and wandered about at night. When asked how she survived and found food, she said that the spirit Fatlips provided it.

Perhaps the most common acceptance today for the name is

said to have come from the male members of the Turnbull household greeting house guests. It is suggested that they were more forward than what was accepted for the times, with the gentlemen kissing the ladies upon entering the castle.

Fatlips Castle, being a significant part of Turnbull history, has long been a destination point for Turnbulls of the Borders and visiting Turnbulls. It has been a dream that the castle be restored and saved from destruction. Many years ago, Gemma (honorary Turnbull) Barnard set about informing people of Fatlips peril and to bring awareness of its need for restoration. Gemma's love for the castle stems from her childhood. Growing up in the Bedrule area, she used to climb the crags to the castle frequently, where she could play and look out across the beautiful Borders. It hurt to see how each year, Fatlips fell into more disrepair.

Her efforts paid off. Local attention brought about National attention and even International attention. In November of 2011, Historic Scotland with the Minto family took on the task of restoring Fatlips. The recognition that Fatlips was in need of restoration and was worthy of restoration is a result of Gemma's vigilance to the project. The community of the Borders and Turnbulls worldwide are deeply indebted to Gemma Hon Turnbull Barnard for her efforts to make and keep Fatlips in the forefront of Borders heritage.

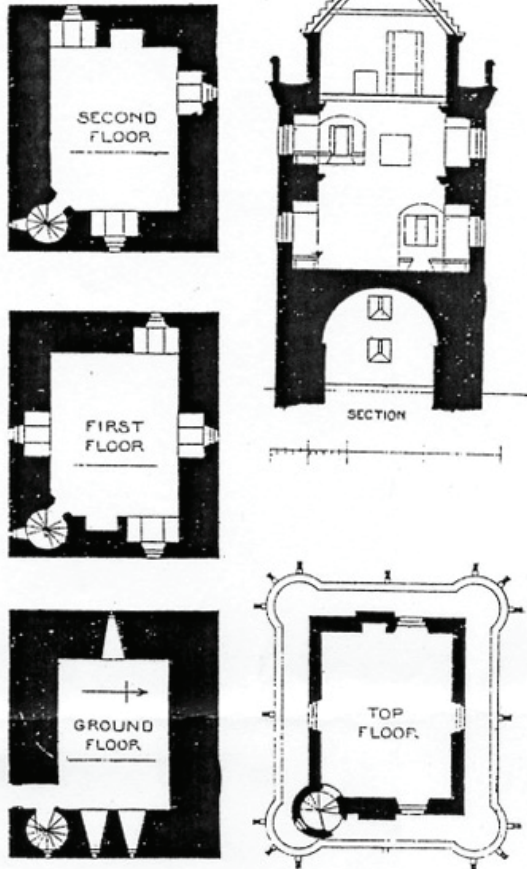

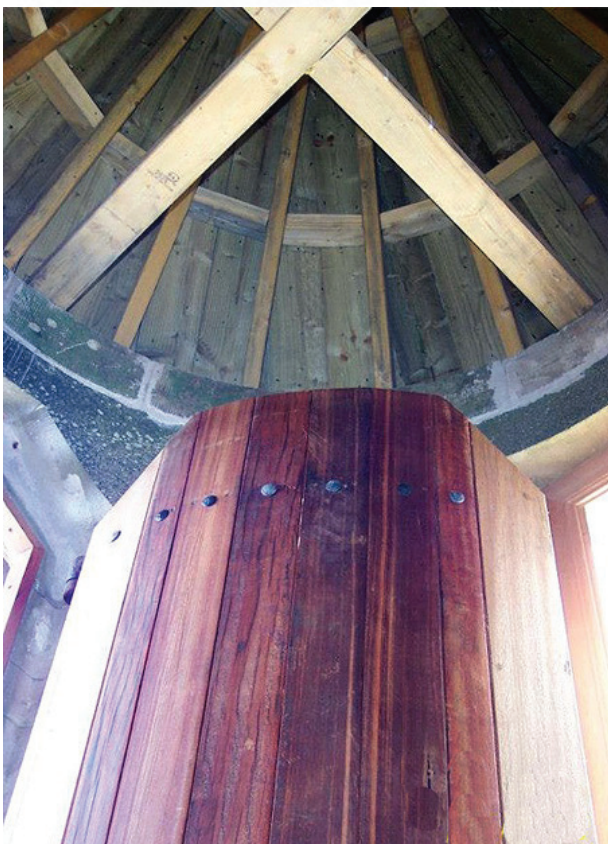
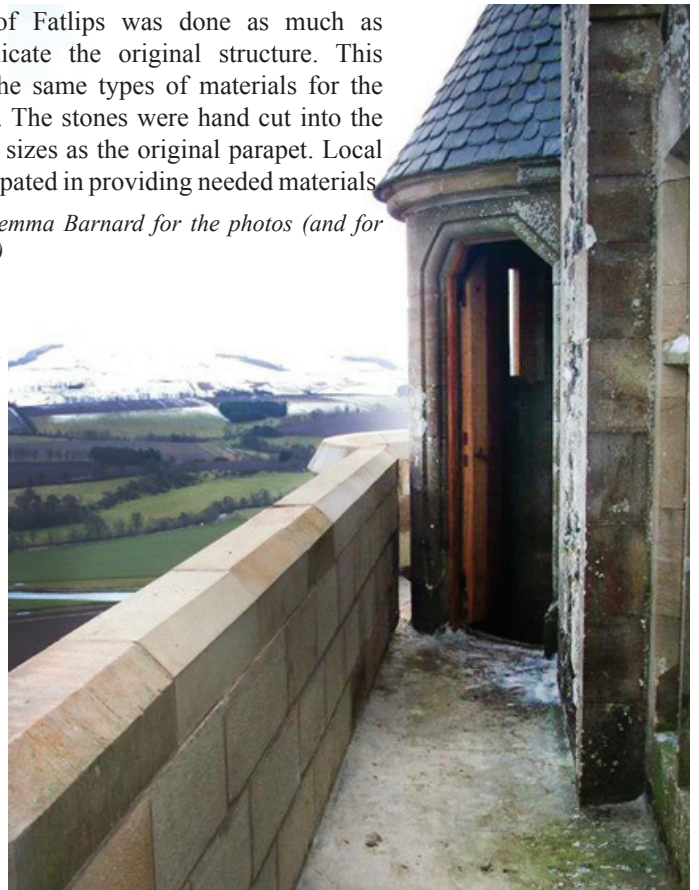

Reconstruction of Fatlips was done as much as possible to replicate the original structure. This included using the same types of materials for the roof and parapet. The stones were hand cut into the same shapes and sizes as the original parapet. Local merchants participated in providing needed materials.

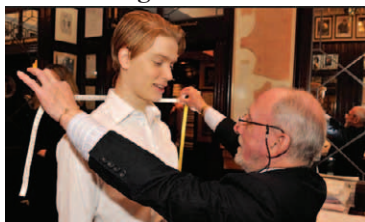
USA - City Hall reveals its history

USA - Who are the Minorcans?



In 1763, Scottish physician Dr. Andrew Turnbull accepted a land grant for an area in Florida from the British with the stipulation that he establish a settlement in the area near the Ponce de Leon Inlet. He started gathering up Greek recruits whom he stationed at the port of Mahon on Minorca while he sought additional recruits. He found Italian males, mainly from Leghorn, Italy, who were willing to join his adventure. They were also brought to Minorca. Greeks from the Island of Corsica also signed with Turnbull. When he returned to Mahon he found that many of the Italians had married Minorcan women. An additional group of about 1,000 Minorcans persuaded Turnbull to accept them as colonists.

Wales - Scarlets flanker keen for Wales second row spot

Scarlets flanker Josh Turnbull has revealed he is willing to help solve Wales' Six Nations second-row injury crisis. Turnbull was included in the 35-man squad with caretaker coach Rob Howley citing the 24-year-old as a second-row option. Wales are reeling from the loss of Luke Charteris for the whole tournament. Turnbull featured as a lock in the second half of last November's defeat to Argentina and could well be pressed into emergency service again.



USA - Learn about State Forests at Turnbull Creek

Turnbull Creek Educational State Forest, in Bladen County, is one of North Carolina's six educational state forests. North



Carolina's educational state forests are described as outdoor classrooms where visitors can learn about the complex ecosystem of a forest and gain a better understanding and appreciation of forests. At Turnbull Creek, this is clearly demonstrated at the Naval Stores Exhibit area, where benches are positioned in front of an original turpentine still (illustrated) that operated from 1890 to 1912. Resin was collected from pine trees by chipping the bark, allowing the gum to ooze down the surface into a collection box. The resin was then delivered to distilleries where it was condensed into turpentine.

New Zealand - Business ready

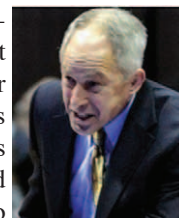
Flying across the world to pitch a business start-up idea is about to become a reality. Terrace Chambers law intern, Mahoney Turnbull has been chosen



from thousands of applicants worldwide as the only Australasian among 30 students to take part in the world business convention challenge at the University of Cologne, Germany. She applied by submitting a video online, winning a place from 2500 applications worldwide.

USA - Wrestling coach speaks out

Although the wrestling dream didn't come true for Craig Turnbull, it's a dream many kids across the world won't be able to have if the International Olympic Committee goes through with its plan to eliminate wrestling, starting in the 2020 Games. The IOC voted to drop wrestling from the Olympics earlier, with a final decision likely to come in May. Like most of the wrestling community, Turnbull was in disbelief when he heard the news. J.M. Barrie

1860-1937

James Matthew Barrie, ninth child of ten, was born in Kirriemuir, Angus, Scotland to a weaver and his wife. When J.M. Barrie was six years old, his next older brother David died shortly before his 14th birthday. As he grew up, Barrie tried to comfort his devastated mother by dressing in David's clothes and acting like him. His mother took comfort in the idea that her son David would always remain a boy who would never grow up and leave her.



As a child, Barrie loved reading books and playing in gardens, acting out pirate adventures with his friends. They formed a drama club, but the boarding school did not allow that to last for very long. As a young adult, Barrie attended Edinburgh University and studied literature. He was a very shy and short man (around 5 feet, 3 inches) who found joy in writing for different newspaper publications. His stories and plays became increasingly popular and established him as a successful writer.

In 1902 *The Little White Bird* or *Adventures in Kensington Gardens* was the first of the stories of Peter Pan. It was made into a play in 1904. Although his list of novels and plays is quite long, Barrie is best known for the stories of Peter Pan, the boy who never grew up. Many of the adventures were inspired and written for the Lewelyn Davies family who had five little boys. Their friendship with Barrie lasted throughout his lifetime.

Peter Pan never wanted to grow up because he thought being a child was much more fun. He didn't realize that he would miss out on many wonderful things in life by never growing up.

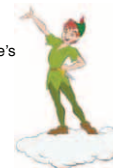

TURNBULL TRAVEL TIPS
