

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NORMAN TURNBULL 1942-2013



Turnbull Clan Association High Shenachie, Norman Turnbull, lost his battle with cancer on June 9, 2013. Norman was a true gentleman who wanted nothing more than to serve his fellow clansmen and help preserve their history.

Norman Turnbull was born June 30, 1942 in Edinburgh, Scotland, son of Mossman and Margaret (Pearl) Turnbull. He grew up on a farm. One of Norman's earliest memories was waking up pre-dawn to hand milk the cows before school. Though hard work, Norman loved the country farm life. At age 18, Norman put aside his love of the countryside for his love for his country and enlisted in the Royal Air Force.

Norman served his country well, but his 15 year enlistment ended 3 years early due to injury to his eardrums. Norman worked various jobs around the Leeds area until he decided to open a garage/car repair shop. He successfully ran this business, but eventually he felt at unrest and the countryside he had grown up loving called to him. He sold his garage and for the first time as an adult

returned to the Borders where he found employment as a shepherd. He loved his sheep and though his flock numbered over 1000, he could identify each one and knew when one was missing.

Norman would tell you that he was always a bit restless and had a "not belonging" felling throughout life.

In his own words, "I have, throughout my life, had a strong feeling that my surname had a part in the history of the Borders.

I left the Borders at an early age to find fame and fortune. Needless to say that after a lot of travel, both in Britain and overseas, neither was ever bestowed upon me. Still, with the feeling of belonging persisting to daunt me, I decided to return to the place of my youth, before I reached retirement.

I was lucky to find employment on Harewood Estate, just outside Bonchester - once the Estate of Dame Lady Elliot - as a shepherd. For once in my life I felt at peace with myself!

At this time I was not fully aware of the history of the Turnbull Clan. It seems ironic now, but there I was, living and working and at peace, in the shadow of Ruberslaw, the lands of my ancestors."

In 2007, I was introduced to the Clan Turnbull at a Gathering at Denholm, and met other Turnbulls from other parts of the world, and heard many tales about how they had this same feeling of "belonging." I think I have more understanding of my life now and I am proud to be part of the Turnbull Clan."

In 2009, Norman worked closely with the local Borders Turnbull Clan Association with preparations for the inaugural of the *Turning of the Bull* monument at the Hawick Heritage Hub. As part of this, he was instrumental in producing, *Turnbull 2009*, a DVD movie telling

the story of the early days of Clan Turnbull from its beginnings through the unveiling of the monument in 2009.

In recognition of his dedication and work on behalf of the Turnbull Clan and because of his keen interest in preserving its history, Norman was appointed the Turnbull Clan High Schenachie by the Turnbull Clan Association Worldwide.

A Shenachie is responsible for making sure the clan's traditions, genealogy, history, and even myths are passed down from generation to generation. Norman took this position very seriously and set about to record in writing Clan and related Border history. Much of his writings were shared through his articles "Turnbull Trails" in the *Bullseye*. He was in the final stages of writing a book entitled, *Border Tales and Trails*, preserving history and stories and sharing information about Border places and battles. (To be published in 2014)

In his last years, Norman, used to living the solitary life of a shepherd, became smitten with a wonderful lady from Aberdeen, Terri Robertson Booth! June 2010 found Norman in St. Andrews doing research and filming for the book, when he spotted Terri, staying in the same hotel. Terri tagged along as he was a knowledgeable guide. A few emails and phone calls later, Norman happily left his borders for Aberdeen.

In 2012, the Terri and Norman travelled to North Carolina, USA, to be married by Honorary Clan Chief and friend, Wally Turnbull. A traditional ceremony mixed with modern took place at the Grandfather Mountain Highland Games, near Boone, NC.

There was a memorial service held in Tenerife, Spain (the couples current home). A memorial service will be held in Scotland in July 2014 in conjunction with the 2014 Cairn dedication in Bedrule, Scotland. Norman's ashes will be returned for his eternal resting place to the land that he loved so dearly and where he found his earthy peace.

Norman will be greatly missed, as High Shenachie, advocate and promoter of Turnbull Clan, but mostly as a good friend and family member. As a fellow Borderer, Gemma Barnard, put it so well, "An inspirational man, and a true gentleman. Thank you for being part of ... life's adventures.."

The History of Trumbull College of Yale University

In 1931 Yale University decided to establish residential dormitories and dining halls called Colleges, based upon the British model used in their Universities. In 1932, 1933, 1935, and in 1940, the first eight colleges were established and then subsequently in 1961 two more colleges were added.

Each college is named for a person or a locality which has a particular connection to Yale University. Also, each college has is own coat of arms, usually borrowed from the family or the locality from which the college is named.

Since their founding, each college has developed their own traditions and their own colors.

Trumbull College was founded in 1933 and named for Jonathan Trumbull (1710-1785) who was the last Royal Governor of Connecticut, and then was the first Governor of the new State of Connecticut after the founding of the United States. He was the only Royal Governor to have made this distinction. Jonathan Trumbull was a friend and an advisor to General George Washington.

His parent's last name was originally Trumble and in 1765 they changed it to Trumbull. His father was originally from Ireland and because Trumbull was Protestant, probably Presbyterian or Congregationalist his ancestry would have come from the Protestant Settlement in Ireland, started by Queen Elizabeth I and continued under James I (of England and James VI of Scotland).

Jonathan Trumbull graduated from Harvard in 1730 and briefly was a Congregational minister. A few years later, he established a trading company with his older brother, following in the same business as his father who had started a trading company in Lebanon, Connecticut. In 1732, his older brother was lost at sea, and Jonathan continued on in the business, studying law and eventually embarking on a remarkable legal career. His

son, John Trumbull (1756-1843) was the well known painter of portraits and Revolutionary Battle scenes.

The Trumbull College Coat of Arms is the Three Bulls heads and its motto in Latin is" Fortuna Favet Audaci" which they translate "Fortune Favors The Brave". Another translation could be "Fortune

Canada - 89-year-old Veteran creates working replica




Ken Turnbull will ever do a full-scale restoration. He was approached by Carman resident Rick Vanderpol to create a working replica ambulance from the First World War to



One of the College's traditions is "The Trumbull Crier" who, every week, shouts from the balcony of the College Dining Room, "It is Six O'clock in Trumbull College and All is Well", and then makes announcements of upcoming events for the week.

By the way, the dining plate used in the Trumbull College Dining Hall has the three Bulls heads on them.

Also in the dining room is a Trumbull flag, which has the three Bulls heads on it. However, each one of the Bulls heads, is slanted to and pointing downward at an angle of about 45 degrees or less, on a Silver background. It hangs on a flag staff. Opposite the flag, there is a tapestry which has the full Turnbull Coat of Arms, with the motto in Latin.

Another tradition is the "Running of the Bulls", which is a race across the campus of Yale to celebrate the end of the school year with food, music and the race (for those who are able) of the "running of the bulls."

A Sticky Situation!

Five businessmen from Minnesota started the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Company (3M) in 1902. After the company nearly collapsed from failed ventures, the founders hired hardworking 20 year-old redhead William McKnight as bookkeeper. He went on to become company president and first chairman of the board.

Legend has it that a young engineer working for the 3M Company, Richard Drew, was working on creating a masking tape to be used for painting cars. Frustrated with the adhesive, he cried out, "Take this tape back to those Scotch bosses of yours and tell them to put more adhesive on it!" The nickname "Scotch" soon "stuck" to the entire line of 3M tapes and the little Scotchman, Scotty McTape, and plaid packaging was introduced in 1945.

The clear cellophane tape was created to help people make-do with simple household repairs during the Great Depression. In 1969, U.S. astronaut Neil Armstrong walked on the moon wearing space boots with soles made by 3M.

Postage Stamp Adhesive



Penicillin

James Chalmer's son claimed in 1837 that his father first suggested the use of a gum like substance to be applied to the back of a sheet of stamped slips which could then applied to a letter to show payment.

Sir Alexander Fleming accidentally discovered penicillin on September 28, 1928 in his lab when he noticed mold growing on a contaminated culture. The mold stopped the bacteria from growing further. Penicillin is used to prevent and treat many serious diseases and infections.

Refrigerator

James Harrison, while cleaning with ether, noticed that the evaporating liquid made metal cold to the touch. In 1854 he created a machine that pumped ether gas through a condenser and circulated through coiled tubes, keeping meat cold. A patent was granted for the process and his machine in 1856.



Charles Mackintosh created rubberized fabric, making it waterproof and patented his invention in 1823. The first waterproof coats were made in his family's textile factory and sold in 1824.

Kellogg Cereal

Scottish descendant William Keith Kellogg, a Seventh-Day Adventist who practiced vegetarianism, pioneered the process of making flaked cereal. In 1897 W.K. Kellogg and his brother John started a food company focusing on flaked whole grain cereals.



Telephone

Alexander Graham Bell successfully spoke into his device to his assistant Thomas Watson on March 10, 1876. "Mr. Watson, come here, I want to see you." On August 10, 1876 Bell spoke to Watson on his device from a distance of 10 miles.

Television

John Logie Baird, building upon work done by others, was the first to successfully transmit a live image of a face on television in 1925.

United States Navy

Scottish born John Paul Jones was America's greatest Revolutionary naval commander and founder of the American naval tradition.

Thermos bottles

James Dewar designed and invented a vacuum flask in 1892. He discovered that liquid could remain the same temperature for a long period of time when placed in a container that was then placed in another container with the air sucked out between the two containers.

Cornflake Cakes (Drop Cookies)

50 g/ 3.5 tbsp butter 100 g/ one half cup chocolate pieces (milk or dark) 3 tbsp golden syrup 100 g/ one and a half cup cornflakes

Melt butter, chocolate and golden syrup in pan over medium low heat. **Pour** over cornflakes.

Stir gently with a wooden spoon.

Arrange into little piles on a baking sheet.
