

THE DEMOGRAPHICS OF SCOTLAND

Good morning class, today we shall discuss the demographic makeup of Scotland. Does anyone know what demographics are? Nah Willie, theey'rrr NOOT exprrres-sive demycrrrats. According to the Merriam Webster Dictionary, demographics are things "relating to the dynamic balance of a population especially with regard to density and capacity for expansion or decline." We will study the population of Scotland, including just whom lives there, what they do, how much they earn, who or what they worship, and so on.

The original Scots arrived on the island that is now known as Great Britain long before political influence was even thought about and freedom from oppression was a thing far in the distant future. Folks came looking for food, shelter and space. Land ownership was not a factor in the early settlement of Scotland. Greed came later.

The beginnings of the Scottish civilization were in villages and small towns that rose up along the coastal areas of the country. At the time of early man it was dangerous to move inland. The leading reason for this danger was the abundance of wildlife roaming the countryside, especially wolves. There is also speculation that the Scots are descendants of Vikings who set up outposts while marauding around the Northern European seas. The Irish people helped to populate Scotland as well, but who were the Irish if not descendants of the seafaring races of men from that time. Later there was an influx of Roman blood blended in along with whatever people came with the Romans.

In 2010 the overall population of Scotland was approximately 5,222,100 persons packed at a density of 65.6/km² or for us in the colonies 170/square mile. For comparison: Macao's population density is 73,350/square mile, and Greenland's is 0.4/square mile. The United States has a mere 84/square mile. Back in Scotland roughly 70% of the population is located in the Central Lowlands between Edinburgh and Glasgow and



including the areas around Paisley, Stirling, Falkirk, Pirth and Dundee. Inverness and Aberdeen also have higher population. The Scottish Highlands have the lowest density of 21/square mile while Glasgow has the highest at 8,530/square mile. The responsibility for tracking all aspects of the Scottish population falls under the General Register Office of Scotland (GROS (of course)) which in turn is headed by the Registrar-General for Scotland. Of those 5+ million folks the labor force is about 2.7 million.

The census taken on June 6, 1841 is thought to be the first important, usable, census taken in Scotland. Even though other counts were made over the centuries and this was the fifth official decennial census, it was the first time that names, ages, occupations and birthplaces were recorded. Prior to that just heads were counted I suppose, for tax purposes. The census taker was usually the local schoolmaster who worked under the sheriff of the county. In 1841 Scotland's population was 2.6 million soles.

Scotland's population is only slightly divers, with 96.28% of the overall population being of Caucasian extraction. The next largest ethnic group is the Pakistani community with .63%. As a side note; while in Edinburgh several years ago I heard several Caucasian shop keepers complain about these immigrants taking business away from them. Just like home... Go figure.

Scotland can also boast a high literacy rate with 99% of the population, both male and female, over the age of 15 being able to read and write. This is most likely due to the fact that the free public school system originated in Scotland. The University of Glasgow was founded in 1451 by Bishop William Turnbull with the encouragement of King James and a Papal Bull issued by Pope Nicholas V. Turnbull served as the first chancellor.

The Scottish people earn their living in the usual ways. Of the almost 5.25 million people living in Scotland over 2.3 million are employed in one way or another. The retail and wholesale sector employs 350,500+; Real Estate and Business Services 349,700; Manufacturing 201,600; Tourist Industries 165,700 and Financial Services 84,600. These are the main sources of income for the population. The rest are made up of various methods of generating income: Entertainment industries, distilling, farming and agriculture, education, law enforcement and judicial, and government, are some of the other ways that Scots support themselves. The average weekly wage for a Scottish worker is £486.90 or \$739.94 US.

Scotland exports most of her manufactured goods with the EU being the largest market. The US and Asia also buy a great deal of Scottish Exports. These products include food and beverages, chemicals, business services, electronics, textiles, petroleum products and renewable energies, equipment and technology.

Of the major cities in Scotland Glasgow is the largest with a population of approximately 598,000 people (2011 estimate). It is the 3rd largest city in the UK and the 40th in the European Union. The capital city of Edinburgh boasts a population of 495,360 which places it as the 7th largest in the UK and 59th in the EU. Both cities are growing steadily and will soon top 600,000 and 500,000 respectively. Other major Scottish cities include Aberdeen with a population of 220,420, Dundee at 145,570, and Stirling with 89,850.

All of these cities are located in the Scottish Lowlands. Aberdeen, Dundee, and Edinburgh are on the eastern coast, Stirling at the innermost tip of the Firth of Forth and Glasgow on the River Clyde in the West central Lowlands.

Scotland's people speak one or more of the three official languages: English, Scots, and Scottish Gaelic. English is the major language but somewhere around 30% of the people also

speak Scots and about 1% are learned in Scottish Gaelic. It is believed though that the number of people that speak Scottish Gaelic is dropping while the number of those that speak Scots is increasing. It would be sad indeed if the Scottish Gaelic language was lost to us.

As to the religious breakdown of the Scottish people; 65.1% profess Christianity, (42.4% Church of Scotland, 15.9% Roman Catholic and 6.8% other Christian denominations). An-



other 27.5% of the people reported that they had no religion and 5.5% did not answer the question. .8% of the Scottish population is Muslim. There is a Jewish population in Scotland as well. The 2001 census, reflects approximately 6,400 Jews living in Scotland, most of whom are in Glasgow (5,000), Edinburgh (1,000) and, to a lesser extent, Dundee with 400.

Scots have spread around the globe in large numbers over the centuries. Somewhere around 2 million Scottish descendants live in the non-Scotland UK alone. The United States has a population of approximately 22 million folks of Scottish descent. 5 million live in Australia, and 4.5 are in Canada. There are (according to the CIA Factbook) about 1 million Scots living in Brazil, 750,000 in the Netherlands, and 500,000 in Poland. We Scots should rule the world!

Nova Scotia - President's first day

For the first time in a long time, Tom Turnbull experienced a "first day

on the job" today. Thirty-eight years after a "first day" with the Batavia Daily News, Turnbull was the new guy trying to figure out where the supply of pens and paper clips were stored in the offices of the Genesee County Chamber of Commerce. Turnbull replaces Lynn Freeman, who retired, as chamber president. The way Turnbull sees it, he's taking over a great organization that doesn't need an overhaul. "Our chamber is one of the best run in the state and that was one of the things that excited me about taking this job," Turnbull said. "The way I look at it is I'm just going to take the baton and keep on running."

New Zealand - Fly My Pretties in Auckland

Fly My Pretties are back. Even before the show started, it was obvious the collective's fifth incarnation haven't



lost their pulling powers. After teaming up with visual/street artist Flox the last time around, this time they have a new partner on board to ensure the night is not only a musical, but also a visual experience. Archives New Zealand, Turnbull Library and National Library of New Zealand have dug deep in their treasure troves and unearthed previously unseen video and photo material. This made a beautiful background for the new and well loved songs from the earlier versions of the show.

Canada - Virtual Health care for the homeless

Ottawa Inner City Health's virtual hospital model is studied and copied by communities around the world. Dr. Jeff Turnbull, chief of staff at The Ottawa Hospital and co-founder and medical director of Ottawa Inner City Health, checks his patient Thomas Sabourin at the special care unit of the Salvation Army residence in the ByWard Market. Sabourin says his life is stabilized and he is receiving treatment and counselling that, he hopes, will allow him to continue his education, get a job and housing.

More than a century ago, Ulladulla came to life every day when the town's steam whistle blew at 7am. The sounding of the whistle at the Mitchell Brothers Mill, signalled the start of the working day from

Pearl, who has a spinal disease, is now looking forward to arranging a holiday suited to her mobility problems away in the sun next year with her husband Frank, sons Kenneth, Kevin and other family members. "We've never really been on a family holiday abroad before and I would like to be able to take my sons and grandson," she said.

Greetings from Bedrule!

After an outstanding summer, we are now enjoying a very pleasant Autumn – and when viewed from Bedrule Church the Autumn colours on Ruberslaw Hill are outstanding.

It has been my privilege to be Minister of Bedrule for four and a half years, and over that time I have enjoyed dipping into the history of the community and church. The name 'Bedrule' first appeared in 1275AD and the Castle there, the home of the Turnbells, is described 'a stronghold pleasantly situated behind the Church, on the banks of the river'.

There has been a church on the present site for many centuries, with the present one being erected in 1804 and rebuilt in 1914. Indeed next year we plan in the Autumn to hold a Flower Festival to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the rebuilding that gives us the fine Church we enjoy today.

Over the centuries the Castle and the Church have seen many changes in the area around as the use of the land has developed. Within living memory Bedrule had its own School with a Headteacher and its own Minister, who lived in the white house just beneath the Church – accessed by steps called 'the Minister's staircase'. Nowadays the children of Bedrule go to school in nearby Denholm, and as Minister I stay in the Manse at Denholm. My responsibilities now include the historic parishes of Bedrule, Denholm, Hobkirk, Minto and Southdean – and there is one Headteacher of the two schools that serve the same area. The staffing of both local School and local Church has followed a similar pattern.

One thing that has not changed is the need to maintain our Church buildings, and our local congregation has been faithful in maintaining the fabric of Bedrule Church. The Visitors' Book in the Church - open day and night – is

witness to the way in which many appreciate the beauty of this well-kept sanctuary. A considerable number of these visitors are Turnbells, and I am always happy to welcome all with the name of Turnbull for weddings and other special occasions.

It is for this reason that I am bold to mention one fabric need, namely the Turnbull Window. To ensure that this window is kept in the best possible condition we need to employ a stained glass expert to renovate it. The estimate for the work is £1000 (approx. \$1600) and any donations from the Turnbells of the world would be gratefully received. We hope to have the work completed by July next year when we look forward to welcoming the Clan for a service and for the unveiling of the new Turnbull Cairn on Sunday 20 July – and that day our congregation would like to offer hospitality over Lunch for all who manage.
