SAVE THE DATE - JUNE 16, 2018

Next year, 2018, marks the 250th anniversary of of the largest British settlement in North America which was founded by Dr. Andrew Turnbull in 1768. The New Smyrna Beach Southeast Volusia Historical Society is developing a year long celebration with various events spanning throughout the 2018 calendar year.

The celebration will not only focus on the Turnbull Settlement years, but there will also be a celebration of what the community has evolved into being over the years following that initial settlement.

The year is already filled with Art, Music and Food festivals that are held annually. The Southeast Volusia Historical Society & New Smyrna Museum of History, in conjunction with the city of New Smyrna Beach, has invited Turnbull Clan Association (TCA) to participate in the celebration.

On Saturday June 16th, 2018, the Historical Society and the Museum will be hosting an all day event that will be held in New Smyrna's Old Fort Park, which holds some of the only physical remains of the original Turnbull colony. The event will highlight the Turnbull Settlement, the ongoing archaeological discovery of that settlement and several other facets of local history including the Civil War and more.

Guard, whose members became honorary 'Turnbulls' this past year will also be present.

The day's event will cover elements of New Smyrna Beach's history as they relate to the 1700's 1800's & 1900's each in a separate section of the park. There will also be other genealogical groups represented including Minorcans from St. Augustine & possibly representation from the Greek or Hellenic group and there will be information about the Balearic Islands in Spain (previously the Minorca and Mallorca islands) where many of the settlers joined Dr. Andrew Turnbull to make the journey.

In conjunction with the day's activities, this will also be the location of the Turnbull Clan Association Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Mark your calendars and plan to attend. In addition to the day's activities, there are many other places and things to see and do in the area. New Smyrna Beach, Daytona Beach, and St. Augustine are just a short distance away. Orlando is about an hour's drive away. 

EASTER DAWN ATOP RUBERSLAW

Around 40 worshippers gathered at dawn on Easter morning on top of Ruberslaw Hill. Local Minister, Rev. Douglas Nicol, who led the service, said: "On a beautiful Scottish Borders morning as the sun rose in the sky we celebrated the resurrection of Jesus - and then like the disciples of old gathered to break bread over breakfast in the Church Hall."

During the 1600s, the restoration King Charles II of Scotland brought about his attempt to impose Episcopal polity on the Church of Scotland. Conventers were groups who sought to maintain the Presbyterian Church as Scotland's Church. The Conventers would sometimes hold early morning 'illegal' prayer services in the crags of Ruberslaw because guards could look down and make sure no one was coming.



About 40 worshipers gathered for sunrise services atop Ruberslaw Easter morning led by the Reverand Douglas Nicol.



Easter Day in 2000 there was an open-air service of worship to commemorate the two thousandth anniversary of the church and to recognize the earlier Christians who had worshiped and prayed there.

Rev. Nicol is the minister for the Ruberslaw churches that include Hobkirk. Southdean. Bedrule. Minto and Denholm parishes. Bedrule Kirk, in particular, has a rich Turnbull history. Within the churches walls are several tributes to its Turnbull history, including a Turnbull Coat of Arms, Turnbull stained glass window, and a plaque to commemorate one of the more famous Borderers, Bishop William Turnbull, who founded Glasgow University.

The Kirk yard is also home to the Turnbull/Bedrule Castle Cairn..

SHEAR DELIGHT

Sheep are an important part of Scottish business, providing meat, milk, and wool for clothing, mattress filling, blankets, and carpets.

Sheep are classified by their purpose (meat, milk, wool), the type of coat (fine, medium, long, or hair), the color of their faces (black, red, white, spotted) or by body characteristics. Naturally hardy, sheep can navigate the rockier, steep terrain and the colder, humid areas of Scotland. Sheep live about 10-12 years. They have four sets of teeth used for grazing and grinding vegetation. In order to break down and digest the grass, weeds, and hay they consume, they "chew the cud" or regurgitate, rechew, and reswallow their food to be processed in their four chambered stomach. Sheep tracks are never straight, but follow winding paths to allow them to observe what is behind them using their wide angle of vision. Their keen vision, hearing, and sense of smell allow them to perceive predators up to 1,500 feet away. When faced with danger, the sheep will flee and then group back together. Modern domesticated breeds rely more on man to protect them from predators. Predators include coyotes, cougars, black bears, foxes, and bobcats, but in the British Isles, the red fox, badger, predatory birds, and domestic dogs pose more of a threat to the sheep.

The Scottish Blackface is the most common breed of domesticated sheep in the United Kingdom. While no one is certain of the origin of the Blackface, records show that 12th century monks raised the forerunners to the modern Blackface sheep for their wool. James IV of Scotland established a flock of 5,000 Blackface in the Borders around 1503. Blackface ewes are protective mothers to their lambs and are also good milkers. The sheep are adept at mountain grazing. The lean lamb meat has a distinctive pleasant flavor and their wool is found be very good for heavier use items such as mattress fillings, tweed coats, and heavy blankets.

Today sheep continue to be an important part of Scottish industry, but are raised more for meat than for their milk or wool.





Did Ewe Know?

Scotland has more sheep than people. According to 2016-2017 census, there are 6,800,000 sheep and almost 5,400,000 people.

Racing sheep is popular. Stuffed dummy jockeys are tied to the back of sheep while they navigate a series of hurdles in the race.

There are eleven colors of wool for a Shetland sheep: white, black, dark brown, emsket (bluish grey), fawn, grey, light grey, mioget (yellowish brown), moorit (reddish brown), musket (pale greyish brown), shaela 1 (dark grey), and shaela 2.



Sheep Snack

Serves 10-12 Adult help needed

- 2 Tbsp butter
- 2 2/3 C mini marshmallows, plus a few extra
- 4 C ringed cereal (chocolate or whole grained)
- 10-12 chocolate covered almonds (white and dark)
- 1/2 C chocolate chips
- 20-24 short pretzel sticks
- Melt butter in saucepan over medium low heat. Add marshmallows and stir just until melted.
- 2. Remove from heat and add cereal.
- 3. Mix until evenly coated.
- 4. **Spoon** out one heaping tablespoon of mixture and **mold** into an egg shape with greased hands.
- 5. **Press** an indention into one side with an almond.
- 6. **Melt** chocolate chips in microwaveable dish for a few seconds. Use this as the glue to adhere the almond head and pretzel legs. **Press** firmly into cereal ball.
- 7. **Cut** reserved marshmallow into small pieces and using melted chocolate, attach to almond head for the ears.
- 8. **Dip** a toothpick into melted chocolate and dot the almond to make eyes.


