OUR BEDRULE KIRK HERITAGE IS IN JEOPARDY Wally Turnbull - Honorary Chief, Turnbull Clan

The future of Bedrule Kirk? We need your urgent support to save it!

"Heritage ground zero" of our Turnbull clan . . . is in peril.

Bedrule Kirk is a historic Turnbull landmark with a breathtaking view across the Rulewater Valley to Ruberslaw Mountain.

The kirkyard, which holds the Turnbull cairn and time capsule, is the resting place of many of our ancestors. The church sanctuary is a holy place where the power of the faith of our fathers is palpable.

The church interior is beautifully decorated with the arms of our forebears, the Bishop William Turnbull plaque, and magnificent stained glass windows, including the famous Turnbull Window.

The Church of Scotland is closing and selling off Bedrule Kirk and others because they have run out of funds to maintain them.

Bedrule Kirk is scheduled to be sold in July, with no guarantee of what will be done with it or even if it will be maintained unless it goes into the right hands.

The Bedrule community-based grassroots effort; **Bedrule Church** Future is raising funds to purchase the church and maintain it to be used for events in the community and beyond as a venue for weddings and similar special occasions.

This will ensure that the church will remain open to our clan family and visitors to appreciate the beautiful building and its interior.

The local Bedrule Church Future group is working with the Scottish Borders Council, who will continue to own and maintain the kirkyard, to upgrade the church building by running plumbing and communications lines suitable for group events.





Please help save Bedrule Kirk for future generations to visit, use, and cherish. We need to raise £35,000 (\$47,000) by July. This means that we must respond quickly and generously.

You may contribute through TCA or the Bedrule Church Future steering group. For those in the US or anywhere other than the UK it is best to donate through TCA. Author Leonor Adriana Rosado-Bonewitz (Turnbull) was born in Mexico and educated in Mexico, England, Canada and the U.S. where she resides.



She majored in French with a minor in Spanish and has worked in the field of translation for over 45 years.

When she read the story of French Commander Hubert Meyer and German Admiral Ernst Schirlitz, she became so moved and inspired by their courage that in 2020, she embarked on the project of translating the book from French to English to welcome a greater number of readers to this inspiring history.

After the Allied D-Day landings in June 1944, Paris was liberated in late August, and the rest of France was freed in the following weeks. However, two pockets of German occupation in Royan and



La Rochelle, both cities along the Atlantic coast, remained occupied for several months more.

By what perilous negotiations were two enemy officers able to avoid disaster in the besieged city? Two men of honour, French Commander Hubert Meyer and German Admiral Ernst Schirlitz, strove to see beyond the war toward reconciliation and the reconstruction of Europe.

British Virgin Islands – The newest centenarian







Scotland's Turnbulls of the 1700's

James Turnbull was paid 2s.5d for 'sharpening Picks' as part of the work involved in constructing a boundary dyke in the area of Hassendean, central Roxburghshire -July 1774

William Turnbull paid £1.2s.6d 'for leading wood' to help in the repairs of fences and 'banking the water' of the river Teviot, at Hawick, Roxburghshire, in 1785

Robert Turnbull was one of five labourers paid for quarrying stones with which to build a stone dyke as a boundary division in upper Liddesdale, Roxburghshire -238 ½ days at 1 shilling per day-1793

WHEN VISITING SCOTLAND . . .

Many 'Threads' users (a social media app) have urged tourists not to tell locals about their Scottish ancestry. In response to the question, one wrote: "Claim to be Scottish as they did an ancestry DNA test."

A second echoed: "Telling Scottish people that they the tourists, are more Scottish than Scottish people."

Many other responses involved incorrect pronunciations of places. From our cities to our villages, even locals can struggle to pronounce them right.

One Threads user stated: "Pronouncing Glasgow as *Glass-cow*." A second agreed, singling out both Glasgow and Edinburgh as commonly mispronounced. Often, the name of the Scottish capital is pronounced as *'Edin-berg'* by those not from Scotland.

Another shared their irritation when tourists mess up their geography, commenting: "Referring to the UK in general as 'England'. You certainly don't want to say 'I love it here in England' when you're in Scotland."

Scots love tourists, we love your excitement and every question you ask us. "We love to share our history and stories with you. The vast majority of us do not care about wrong pronunciation. Then again, most of us can't pronounce villages up in the Highlands ourselves."

"We also don't care if you are half or quarter Scottish, we just love the fact that you know about your origins and I can guarantee that most of us would help you find grave stones or information on where your family came from." HISTORIC SCOTLAND AROUND THE BORDERS ...

A HISTORICAL VISION OF THE PAST AT GALLOWAY

An enormous pile of stones is all that remains of the ancient chambered cairn of Boreland in Knockman Wood, Galloway. These cairns were built around six thousand years ago by Neolithic farming pioneers to make the area their home.



Visitors to the ancient, chambered cairn of Boreland in Knockman Wood, Galloway can now step back in time to see how the ruin once looked around 6,000 years ago. An enormous pile of stones is all that remains of the cairn built by the Neolithic farming pioneers who made the area their home but now an innovative new visualisation allows people to imagine what the cairn would have looked like in the past. Hundreds of photographs taken from drone have been used to create a 3D model of the tomb – a technique known as photogrammetry.


The full textured model of the site is used as the foundation for reimagining the monument in its original state and how the cairn may have been used by those who built it. Working with professional archaeologist and artist Marcus Abbott, Forestry and Land Scotland (FLS), has also produced an online, viewed on the FLS website:

Vibrant ancient society

FLS Archaeologist Matt Ritchie said: "This visualisation allows us to imagine what this Clyde Cairn - a type of tomb characteristic of southwest Scotland – would have looked like when it was first built. The architecture suggests its use as both a tomb for the dead, where people placed the deceased in the chambers within the cairn, and a space for the living, where people could pay their respects within the forecourt. Archaeological studies of these chambered cairns can reveal only the bare bones of their story, leaving much to the imagination.

But they were built by a vibrant ancient society with beliefs, traditions and practices that would seem very strange to us today. Watching the video and seeing the cairn come to life will hopefully get visitors at the site – and those visiting online – curious and questioning whether the ceremonies that accompanied the placing of the dead in these monuments were small family affairs or large communal



gatherings? Were there drums and chanting, dancing and trance-like states? Perhaps there were grand fire-lit feasts with songs, speeches and toasts? Or were there solemn torch-lit processions, arcane rituals and strange incantations?"

Of the cairns that survive across Scotland, some remain closed, their secrets hidden beneath huge mounds of stone, such as at Boreland in Galloway. Others bear the ravages of time, their features masked by rubble and collapse. Or have disturbed by treasure-hunters, their chambers ripped open and exposed. Many more have simply been lost over time. Matt added: "The reconstruction of Boreland really helps us appreciate and understand the remains of the chambered cairn as it survives today. It can be difficult to connect with these people and communities from so long ago, but their lands are our land and by re-imagining and appreciating these ancient structures that they left behind, their story is told and can connect us today with the lives of our ancestors."

bull to save the king. While I do not remember many details of this trip, I do remember hearing from an early age about the legend of the Turnbull name and the rich legacy of service that my name represented.

My grandparents and great-grandparents spent many years as missionaries in the country of Haiti. My father served over twenty-nine years in the US Air Force and later the US Space Force. Growing up I recall frequently seeing "service before self" modeled and encouraged. Every day I walked past literal signs hung in our home reminding me of this Turnbull value... One sign, which hung in our hallway, says "Do what is right, not what is easy". Walking past these signs each day, I didn't think much of this but looking back, these signs were just one of many ways my family modeled and encouraged service to others. To me, this is what it means to be a Turnbull."

Wyatt Trimble of Huntsville, Alabama plans on pursuing his degree to become a Certified Register Nurse Anesthetist.

Wyatt shares "My Turnbull heritage is an important part of who I am and continues to shape the person I strive to become. While I've been attending Scottish games for as long as I

Standing on the land where our ancestors once walked gave me a deep sense of pride and belonging. It was no longer just a family tradition; it became a personal journey to learn more about my roots and how they influence my life today.

Whether through my education, my role as Assistant Captain of my hockey team, or my involvement in nursing student leadership, I try to embody the values that have defined our clan for generations. 




In a Nutshell

Gowf, or golf was a game played on the eastern coast of Scotland in the Kingdom of Fife in the 15th century. The game first used sticks to hit pebbles around natural sand dunes and rabbit runs. By 1553 the clergy at St. Andrews Cathedral allowed the public to play the game around the grounds of the church. Formal rules of the game were drafted around 1744 and by 1764 the eighteen hole course was constructed around St. Andrews. By this time sticks and pebbles had changed to beechwood, apple wood, or iron club heads attached to ash or hazel wood shafts. Balls were made from tightly pressed bundles of feathers wrapped in a stitched horse hide sack.

SCOTTISH INVENTORS: JOHN BROADWOOD - THE GRAND PIANO

Scottish entrepreneurs, geniuses and eccentric inventors and their ability to think outside the square, have helped to change our everyday lives throughout the world for the better. Here is another example of Scottish ingenuity with imaginative foresight that has ultimately influenced the developing world.



At the age of 29, Scottish cabinet maker John Broadwood from Berwickshie, travelled to London from Scotland seeking work and was employed as an apprentice for the Swiss harpsichord maker Burkat Shudi. Shudi was one of the greatest instrument makers at the time.

In 1765, nine-year-old child prodigy Amadeus Mozart had been sent to London to play a Shudi harpsichord. However, Shudi was more impressed by his young apprentice, Broadwood. So much so, that he made Broadwood a partner in the business. John married Shudi's daughter Barbara in 1769 where they produced four children. Sadly and tragically, his young first wife died. After Shudi senior's death in 1773. Broadwood eventually married Mary Kitson in 1781. His second marriage bore him six children, resulting in a sizeable family to help keep the piano business

John Broadwood - 1732-1812 going. John Broadwood took control of the company from his brother-in-law in 1783.

Broadwood set about improving piano design, shifting from the traditional box shape, or square design to a new model, a prototype grand piano, which he perfected around 1777. Along the way Broadwood patented the foot-pedal for modulating the sound, doing away with the clumsy levers that were then in use. He further improved the tonal quality of pianos with such innovations as the bass bridge.

Broadwood became so successful that he abandoned the manufacture of harpsichords altogether to focus solely on his pianos, which were sold throughout Europe. In 1794, he extended the range of the instrument to produce the first six-octave grand piano. The music world was hugely impressed, and continued to favour this piano after Broadwood's death. Among the firm's clients have been some of the greatest piano composers and players ever; including Mozart, Haydn, Chopin, Beethoven and Liszt. Broadwood is also credited, together with Robert Stodart, founder of another famous firm of piano makers Americus Backers to perfect the 'English Grand Action' which remained in use by many makers virtually unchanged in Broadwoods' case, for over 100 years.

John Broadwood & Sons is the oldest and one of the most prestigious piano companies in the world. Many of his descendants were involved in pianoforte manufacturing in England. Others emigrated to Australia, where Broadwood descendants still live. The company holds the Royal Warrant as the manufacturer of grand pianos from King George III (*late 1700's*) continuously through to Queen Elizabeth II.


