

## PURCHASE OF BEDRULE CHURCH HAS BEEN FINALISED

**On Friday 19th December the new owners took possession of the Bedrule Church, in Rulewater, after buying it from the Church of Scotland.**

At a well-attended event in Bedrule Church lying in the heart of Scotland's Turnbull country, on Sunday 21st December, the new owners - the Charity **Bedrule Church Future** - celebrated taking possession of the Church from Church of Scotland, who are disposing a large number of their Churches throughout Scotland.

Members of the Rulewater community and other supporters of the Charity gathered in a festively decorated Church to raise a glass to the success of a year-long campaign which saw wide ranging community consultation, the formation of a Charity and a successful fund-raising campaign.

When it was confirmed that Church of Scotland intended to sell Bedrule Church, a group was constituted that negotiated 'Preferred Bidder' status with the Church of Scotland. The timetable demanded by the Church of Scotland made it impossible to seek funding from sources such as the Scottish Land Fund, and so all money was raised through crowd funding.

As well as strong local support, people who have moved away from Rulewater were instrumental in raising a third of the required funding. The Turnbull Clan, for whom Bedrule is what the Clan Chief Wally Turnbull calls their "ground zero", was given special mention.

Alan Bailey, chair of Bedrule Church Future, told attendees that, after 100 years of ownership by the Church of Scotland, the building was back in the hands of the Rulewater community. He said there are good prospects for the Church's future, as a place of worship with other community-oriented initiatives and activities to ensure a sound financial base. He thanked all supporters for their help to achieve success for the campaign.



## Did you know . . .

Following the Scottish Reformation, the celebration of Christmas was officially banned by an Act of Parliament in 1640. The Church of Scotland (the Kirk) viewed Christmas as a “popish” or Catholic festival with unbiblical and extravagant traditions. As the ban was still strongly felt in 1819 (it was not made a public holiday until 1958). So, 25th December was a normal working day for most people who channeled their festive energy into New Year celebrations . . ‘Hogmanay’.

## AROUND SCOTLAND TODAY . . .

### Dual language status

Both the Gaelic and Scots languages have now gained official status in Scotland. The designation forms part of a range of measures which came into effect on St Andrew's Day 30th November, 2025 through the Scottish Languages Act 2025. These include powers for ministers to commission research into the use of Gaelic and Scots and establish teaching and learning standards for the languages within the schools and enable students to learn and speak Gaelic as an official second language.

### Shetland Islands celebrations

‘Up Helly Aa’ is a series of fire festivals held every winter in the Shetland Islands. January in Shetland means Vikings and one of the planet’s greatest winter fire festivals. Scotland meets Scandinavia in Shetland with this Norse enriched event which lights up the dark Shetland lights and heralds the soon closing of winters door.

The origin of the name ‘Up Helly Aa’ is uncertain, but is thought it refers to a celebration of the last day of Christmas festivities; a day of fire, feasting and fun. The festival’s roots date back to the early 1800s. Groups of young men in disguise would drag barrels of lighted tar on sledges through the streets of the islands’ capital, Lerwick. The spectacular sight takes place on the last Tuesday in January every year.

### Centenarians

The number of people aged 100 and over has risen by four percent in the year to June 2024, according to National Records of Scotland (NRS). The latest estimates show there were 1,020 centenarians living in Scotland; 830 female centenarians and 190 male. In the 10 years between mid-2014 and mid-2024, the number of male centenarians rose by 58% while the number of females rose by 5%.

## FAMILY HISTORY

**COROMANDEL'S VOYAGE TO SOUTHERN LANDS***Sailing ship Coromandel*

**The Coromandel was built in India in 1793, using teak timber and designed with a smooth hull for speed, it weighed 522 tons and could accommodate 226 people. This first long voyage would last 121 days non-stop to the southern land and was the first convict ship to sail direct without touching land anywhere.**

With four years in their planning, the Turnbulls and seven other families were very fortunate to sail as free settlers, because the main contract was the transportation of one hundred and thirty eight male convicts (many selected for their trade skills) to the penal colony at Botany Bay.

All the families, Davison, Hall, Howe, Johnston, Johnstone, Mein, Stubbs and Turnbull, sailed to the new Colony with a request that they be settled together. Their wishes granted by Governor King.

The families were fed by the Government during the voyage. On arrival in the Colony, 100 acres of land was granted at Portland Head in 1803 and for the term of 12 months, they were fed and clothed free from the Public Store and allocated supplies, two prisoners, stock, grain and agricultural tools. After this time, the families were of no further expense to the Crown.



Motivation to emigrate with many families emerged through the practice of the Presbyterian faith in England that had also been severely restricted with several acts of Parliament, proclaiming that no one could be legally married except through a church of England Parson. However, to protect their standing, criticism at the time with their overall situation, would have been very much contained.

Resenting the restrictions these families decided to take matters into their own hands. Both the men and women were of strong conviction in their faith and this situation was quite exasperating. Eight families had decided to emigrate because of the harsh conditions they had endured around London. It was crime-ridden with pickpockets and wide drunkenness. As well, it was a totally unsanitary and dirty city, with raw sewage running onto the narrow streets. Starting a new life was their chance to be free from these unpleasant conditions, their positive outlook promised them a better life.

On landing and over the first few months of unproductive farming, the settlers were then allocated land further out of Sydney . . . on the Hawkesbury River . . . and so a new free settlement area 'Ebenezer' was established.

## EBENEZER, THE OLDEST CHURCH IN AUSTRALIA

*In 1808, at a special meeting in the home of Dr Thomas Arndell, a surgeon who came out on the First Fleet, each family pledged to the building of a church and school. The total cost of £400 (around £42,817 today) which was to be obtained from voluntary subscriptions. There was no assistance by way of finance or labour from the government.*

Pioneer Owen Cavanough donated four acres of land on which to build the church and Andrew Johnston planned, designed and supervised its construction. George Hall swam his bullocks across the river to haul the stone to the site. It was constructed in 1809 built of locally obtained materials, sandstone, cedar wood and hardwood.

Under the leadership of the Presbyterian James Mein and due to the influence of Reverend John Dunmore Lang from Sydney Town, Ebenezer Church became the first Presbyterian Church in Australia. Ebenezer Church is now the oldest existing church in Australia that is still active today, tended to by descendants of the first settlers in the Ebenezer area. Descendants of John and Ann Turnbull gathered at the bicentenary celebration held on 20th June, 2009 to honour this occasion.

Percy Harrison, who was a direct descendant of John Turnbull, his wife, Ann Warr, and their four children who came to Australia as free settlers on the Coromandel journey back in 1802, along with hundreds of other descendants, used the occasion to celebrate their 206th year reunion at the Ebenezer Church, to coincide with the church's bicentenary celebrations on the same weekend.

A keen genealogist, Percy was kept very busy all day in the Turnbull tent, on his new laptop, bought specially for the reunion, checking over 900 pages of details relating to the Turnbull register, which he compiled and holds over 120,000 names, with people keen to find out more about their ancestors and register, if their name wasn't on the existing list.

The Turnbull family tapestry (above) lists James and Mary Ann Turnbull's children, now owned by Percy, was on display in the tent, proving to be of great interest to many on the day, including Malcolm Turnbull and his wife Lucy.

It was handed down through the family by Percy's aunt Maud, who was the daughter of Selina Sophia Turnbull, who is also listed. The framed tapestry was housed at the family dairy farm at Port Macquarie, but damaged in a flood. Percy had it professionally restored some years later.

Malcolm Turnbull MP, the leader of the Liberal Party (*in opposition at the time*) took time out from his busy schedule to take part and renew family ties, as he is also a direct descendant, from two of the lines, making him a distant cousin to Percy.

### UK - Exploring the cancer genes gaps

Traditionally, clinical genetics services offered 'reactive' testing of specific cancer susceptibility genes (CSGs) to those with the corresponding classical presentation. Increasingly, cancer susceptibility gene germline pathogenic

variants (CSG-GPVs) are being looked for much more 'proactively'. Professor Clare Turnbull of Translational Cancer Genetics is in the Division of Genetics and Epidemiology at the Institute of Cancer Research, London and an NHS consultant in Clinical Cancer Genetics at The Royal Marsden. Her research focuses on statistical, population and public-health-related analyses to inform clinical implementation of cancer susceptibility genetics.

### UK - An inspirational young girl

After surviving a rare and deadly childhood cancer, a Bury school-girl is now celebrating a very different kind of victory. She became a world champion on the international martial arts stage. Sorrelle Turnbull, from Walshaw in Bury, north of Manchester. She was only 10 months-old when diagnosed with rare Infant Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia. ### WHEN EVERY OUNCE MATTERED:

This issue we are focusing on the website's virtual museum and a Turnbull business that changed the way everyday people shopped and prepared foods.

Before barcodes, plastic packaging, and neatly labeled weights, accuracy in the kitchen depended on iron, ingenuity, and trust. In the mid-to-late 19th century, few names were more closely associated with that trust than the Turnbull Scale Company - a New York-based manufacturer whose scales became fixtures in American homes and grocery stores.

Active from the 1850s through to the late 1800s, the Turnbull Scale Company, often known as Turnbull's Family Scales, emerged at a time when nearly all food was sold in bulk. Flour, sugar, beans, and coffee were scooped from barrels, weighed on the spot, and paid for by the pound. Turnbull's cast-iron scales

gave families a way to double-check purchases and ensured grocers could serve customers fairly.

One of the company's earliest and most influential innovations came with its 13<sup>th</sup> September, 1859 patent for counter scales. Marketed toward housewives, these scales empowered customers to verify grocery weights at home; an early consumer protection tool long before regulations and standardized packaging.

Turnbull's designs didn't stop at household counters. Over the next two decades, the company refined and expanded its offerings.

1874 saw the introduction of a professional grocer's scale capable of weighing up to 32 pounds. Many of these featured a clever double-sided dial, allowing both merchant and customer to see the weight at the same time.

1877 brought patents for graduated hanging scales and improved upright household scales, typically measuring up to 16 or 24 pounds.


Built from heavy cast iron, Turnbull scales were made to last. Most were finished in classic black paint, often accented with gold pin striping or decorative transfer portraits. Higher-end grocer models even incorporated marble platforms for durability and cleanliness; practical elegance for busy stores.

The durability of Turnbull scales became legendary. Historical accounts describe some remaining in daily commercial use for over a century. One notable example served faithfully in a Hillsdale, Kansas country store from the mid-1800s until the shop finally closed in 1987, a remarkable lifespan for any piece of equipment.

Today, Turnbull scales are prized collectibles, cherished for both their craftsmanship and what they reveal about everyday life before the age of pre-packaged food. Antique markets occasionally yield these heavy survivors, sometimes still bearing their original paint and patent markings. Organizations such as the International Society of Antique Scale Collectors continue to document and celebrate these artifacts, preserving the story of how Americans once measured their meal, one careful pound at a time.

In an era when precision was personal and every ounce mattered, the Turnbull Scale Company helped tip the balance toward fairness, durability, and trust.






# SCOTTISH INVENTIONS: THE CARRONADE CANNON – LATE 1700'S

Scottish entrepreneurs, geniuses and eccentric inventors and their ability to think outside the square, have helped to change our everyday lives throughout the world for the better. Here is another example of Scottish ingenuity with imaginative foresight that has ultimately influenced the developing world.



Lieutenant General Robert Melville

These powerful but light guns, named after the company, were first made in 1778 and soon became a great favourite of Admiral Nelson's navy. First manufactured by the Carron Iron Works in Stirlingshire, the Carronade was invented in 1759 by Robert Melville, a Scottish officer from a well-heeled Fifeshire family.

Melville was fascinated by artillery and spent a lot of time studying ordnance, with the development and testing of cannons, ammunition and the like. He came up with the Carronade, which he nicknamed 'the smasher'. It was a stubby, short-range gun that used less gunpowder than a traditional long-range gun and fired a relatively slow-moving cannonball. But when used properly it had an unrivalled capacity to wreak utter devastation on an enemy ship. Close-range fighting was the preferred tactic of the Royal Navy, because with this weapon, they could smash through the enemy's hull or wipe the crew off their main deck.

The Carronade, which eventually ranged in calibre from small two pounders up to huge sixty-eight pounders, was mounted on a carriage and elevated up or down by a screw. The Carronade came to be known as 'the Devil's gun' among British seamen. It was one of the most important military inventions of the eighteenth century.

By 1781, more than six hundred Carronades were mounted on Royal Navy warships. The gun proved decisive in several British victories over their enemies, as were the French, outflanked by this cannon for around twenty years until they came up with their own version.


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


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A cannonade six pounder cannon - 1781

This Bute Mazer was made soon after the Battle of Bannockburn in 1314, where Robert the Bruce led the Scots to victory against the English. The mazer uses heraldry (which was easily understood at the time) to demonstrate Bruce's authority as king. He is represented as a lion and surrounded by shields bearing the coats of arms of his main supporters. The lion symbolising power, had been adopted by the Scottish monarchy as early as the 12th century. It was used on the royal coat of arms. On display at the National Museum of Scotland Ed.
