Kenneth Grahame

1859-1932

Kenneth Grahame was born in March 8, 1859 in Edinburgh, Scotland. When he was about a year old his family moved to a seaside town where he happily lived until he was five. There his mother died in childbirth with his youngest brother. His father, unable to care for Kenneth and his two brothers and sister, sent them to live with their grandmother. Living there the children were allowed to freely explore the surrounding woods and waterways. Kenneth's uncle introduced him to boating on the River Thames. Later, because of the cost, Kenneth was unable to attend Oxford University and instead worked at the Bank of England. He worked hard and eventually was promoted to Secretary of the bank before he retired in 1908. In 1899 he married Elspeth Thomsan and they had one child, Alastair or "Mouse". His son was partially blind and sickly and died at the age of 19. Throughout Alastair's childhood, Grahame told him many bedtime stories about the adventures of Mole, Water Rat, shy Badger, and daring Mr. Toad that would eventually become the well known classic *The Wind in the* Willows. The main character, Mr. Toad, with his head strong nature, was based on his own son Alastair. The Wind in the Willows was published in 1908 and became a favorite among both children and adults. Grahame published many other stories for newspapers as a young adult, including *The* Reluctant Dragon, but The Wind in the Willows remains the best known and loved of all of his stories. He died in 1932.


Return to the Willows by Jacqueline Kelly (288 pages, ages 8+) Enjoy more fun adventures with the same four river friends. Beautifully illustrated.
