Sandpoint Filmed For TV Feature

Sandpoint is scheduled to be featured on a television series called "Community Close Up" on September 1, Larry Gants, Series Co-Ordinator for the KHQ television series announced

yesterday in this city.

Gants and a crew of four technicians and engineers from the television station spent about an hour in Sandpoint yesterday afternoon filming the documentary-type program which included interviews on video tape with Mayor Floyd Gray; Bill Nordeen, representing the Sandpoint Chamber of Commerce; and Mel Nesbitt, representing the Sandpoint "Old Timers."

The KHQ remote control unit which features the truck-top video camera roamed the City of Sandpoint for almost an hour yesterday filming the town's central business district as well as key outlying areas.

Nesbitt, who has been a Sandpoint since 1893, was interviewed and asked about the changes which he has seen take place in the city over the past seventy years. Bill Nordeen was also interviewed, along with the Sandpoint Mayor Floyd Gray.

Both Nordeen and Gray discussed the economic growth of the City as well as other factors which would be of interest to a television viewing public not familiar with this city.

"Community Close Up" is a series seen regularly every Tuesday evening in the 6:30 and 11 p.m. newscasts on Q-6 television. Sandpoint will be featured on this series show scheduled for September 1, the program director said.

Woman's Day Coming Soon

WASHINGTON (UPI) — If groups fighting for women's liberation have their way, here's what you may see on Aug. 26, the 50th anniversary of woman's suffrage:

Housewives won't cook, sew or wash dishes; secretaries will wear slacks instead of skirts; others will strike or stage a work slowdown and some mothers will take babies to the father's office to have him baby sit.

Stores will be devoid of women except for clerks forced to work.

Presumably some women will refuse to wear bras; walk through doors held open by males; take a seat offered them on a bus or wear anything that smacks of the latest in fashion.

Part of that, at least, is the dream of Darby Costello, secretary of the Washington chapter of the National Organization for Women (NOW).

She is calling for women nationwide to use that day to free themselves of "whatever is oppressive in their lives." She used a news conference Thursday to exhort women to "demonstrate against continuing discrimination and subjugation of women to inferior supportive roles."
