McEnroe, Navratilova rule at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI) -John McEnroe tightened his grip on the top spot in men's tennis with a stunning 6-1, 6-1, 6-2 triumph over Jimmy Connors Sunday in a sweltering finale to the \$2.2 million Wimbledon Championships

But the 25-year-old McEnroe, who used his racket instead of his sometimes abrasive mouth during the wo-week long tournament, sees his third Wimbledon victory in four years as just the beginning

"I feel I have four or five more chances to win here at Wimbledon and I'm looking forward to it," McEnroe said after dropping just four games against Connors in 102-degree heat

1981 and 1983, and unstoppable woman's champion Martina Navratilova, who notched her third straight crown Saturday with a convincing 7-6 (7-5), 6-2 win over fellow-American Chris Evert Lloyd, dominated the 107th Wimbledon championships.

For the first time in the history of the world's most prestigious tennis tournament, the defending champions in all five events retained their titles.

In addition to their singles crowns, McEnroe and Navratilova both added some small change to their already bulging bank accounts with victories in their respective doubles.

In women's doubles, grand slam champions Navratilova and Pam Shriver stopped the U.S. pair of Kathy Jordan and Anne Smith with ease 6-3, 6-4, on Saturday. And in mixed doubles, Briton John Lloyd, the estranged husband of Chris Evert Lloyd, and partner Wendy Turnbull of Australia, defeated Americans Steve Denton and Jordan 6-3, 6-3.

McEnroe's calm march into Sunday's finale proceeded like clockwork as the New Yorker dropped only one set in six matches. That was a

McEnroe served up 10 aces and allowed Connors to gain a paltry 11 points over McEnroe's 12 service games Connors stumbled through could at all times Days like this he had ever encountered on grass

Both No. 1 McEnroe, a winner in Peter Fleming held onto their men's tiebreaker in his first-round match five double faults in a match which he arise

McEnroe, making his fifth consecutive appearance in the finals, found enough angles to confound even Euclid as he became the first American to win the title back-to-back since Budge in 1937-38

"I was just thankful I played one of the best matches I have ever played," McEnroe said

McEnroe, who has now beaten Connors in their last six meetings and holds a 15-12 career edge, admitted he was not certain of victory until the last point, recalling how he led Czechoslova Ivan Lendl two sets to love in the French Open final three weeks ago only to suffer his only defeat in 54 matches this year

Connors, playing in his sixth Wimbledon final in 10 years, said McEnroe's performance was the best

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - The outcome of the All-Star baseball game, once as predictable as a George Steinbrenner managerial change, has suddenly become as unpredictable as the swirling winds that will howl through Candlestick Park in Tuesday night's 55th annual midsummer

extravaganza. Until it was beaten in the 50th anniversary game, 13-3, last season, the National League had won 18 of the previous 19 All-Star contests and had so dominated the show that many fans weren't even bothering to tune in the contest on

television. Ah, but that's all changing now. At least Sparky Anderson says it is and maybe he should know better than most. After all, he did manage in the NL for nine years with the Cincinnati Reds before taking over as manager of the Detroit Tigers in 1979.

Anderson is a firm believer that the talent has shifted to the AL.

"The American League has simply come up with more talent during the last seven years, and that's where we've passed them," said Anderson. "They had Billy Williams, Willie Stargell, Johnny Bench. But now the American League has the Bretts, the Trammells, the Whitakers, the Parrishes, the Rices, the Coopers, the Younts. And we haven't even mentioned the kids in Toronto.

"No question in my mind the pendulum has swung and the American League will be dominant for a long time "

The AL will start a team of California's Rod Carew at first base: Detroit's Lou Whitaker at second base; Baltimore's Cal Ripken at shortstop; Kansas City's George Brett at third base; Detroit's Lance Parrish at catcher; and New York's Dave Winfield. Starting for the NL will be San Diego's Steve Garvey at first base: Chicago's Ryne Sandberg at second base; St. Louis' Ozzie Smith at shortstop; Philadelphia's Mike Schmidt at third base; Montreal's Gary Carter at catcher; and New York's Darryl Strawberry, Atlanta's Dale Murphy and San Diego's Tony Gwynn in the outfield
