

The Trumbull Line

(I) John Trumbull, a cooper, came from Newcastle-on-Tyne to New England, and settled in Rowley, Massachusetts, in 1640. He was in Roxbury as early as 1639, and was a member of the Apostle John Eliot's church. He shortly removed, however, to Rowley, and his homestead was in the heart of that village, fronting on the common. He taught the first school in the town, was a freeman, May 13, 1640, selectman in 1650 and 1652, town clerk 1654 to 1656, and died in 1657. He was buried May 18 of that year.

He married in England, in 1635, **Eleanor Chandler**, and brought his wife and a son John with him. Her name appears in the New England records as Ellen.

She died about 1648-49, and he married (second) in August, 1650, Ann, widow of Michael Hopkinson, of Rowley. She survived him and married (third) March 1, 1658, Richard Swan, as his second wife. She died in Rowley, and was buried April 5, 1678.

Richard Swan, husb., was admitted to the ch. in Boston, "6-11 mo. 1638" and was dismissed to "ye gathering" of a ch. at Rowley, "24-9 mo. 1639." He was made a freeman May 13, 1640. He had a two acre house-lot assigned him in 1643. His wife, Anna, accompanied him to rowley, and was bur. there Apr. 4, 1658. He m. (2d), at Rowley, mar. 1, 1658/9, Ann, **wid. of John Trumbull**. Notes

Probably not the John Trumble baptied 5 April 1612 at Chapelry of All Saints, Newcastle upon Tyne "The records (of the Chapelry of All Saints, Newcastle upon Tyne) only commence in 1600, and the only baptism which could, chronologically, been that of our man, is John the son of James in 1612, and I have serious doubts as to their identity for this reason - John Trumble of Rowley was evidently a man of more than ordinary education and intelligence, he wrote a clerkly hand (no common accomplishment in those days), was Town Clerk of Rowley until his death in 1656, and taught the first school there: but James, the father of the John baptized in 1612, is recorded as a "Kielman," that is, he occupied the humble position of a laborer on one of the keelboats or lighters used in loading vessels or conveying freight about the wharves, and it does not seem likely that a man in his position could have given his son the education which we know

the emigrant to have possessed."[3]

John Trumble (Trumbull) was born 5 April 1612 in Newcastle Upon Tyne, Northumberland, England, the son of James Trumble and Janet Straker. On 7 July 1635 he was married to Eleanor (a/k/a Elinor and Ellen) Lupo, born in 1615 in Northumberland, England, the daughter of Albiano Lupo and Elizabeth Bassano. Albiano died in 1626 and Eleanor assumed the last name of her mother's 2nd husband, John Chandler. John, Eleanor and their young child, John (1637-1690/1) emigrated to New England in 1637 and settled in Roxbury, Massachusetts, later moving on to Rowley, Massachusetts where he taught the first school and was town clerk from 1650 until his death. They had three more children together—Judah (1643-1692), Ruth (1645-) and Joseph (1647-1684)—before Eleanor died in 1648/49.⁴
